

SENATORS' CLIMB CONTINUES WITH DEFEAT FOR A'S

Great Lefty Grove Yields Winning Hit in 12th Frame —Chisox Cling to Second Place Tie With Solons

By HUGH S. FULLERTON, Jr. Associated Press Sports Writer. If the western clubs of the American league can do their bit toward helping out the Washington Senators this month, it looks as if there might be some tough sledding ahead for the New York Yankees.

Largely at the expense of the Yankees, the Senators have climbed into the contending position that was predicted for them. In their recent series, they took four out of five games from New York, the only ones the Yankees have lost in 15 starts.

Grove Yields Hit. Then, perhaps the first to show how tough they can be, the Senators beat the Philadelphia Athletics and the great Lefty Grove 5 to 4 in a 12-inning struggle yesterday, to make it four triumphs in a row and seven in their last eight games. Twice the Senators overcame two-run leads by the A's first against Rube Walberg, who started the game, then against Grove. Finally, with two out in the 12th, Joe Kuhel stretched out a hit for two bases, and Bob Boken, ronkie second sacker, caught one of Grove's fireballs on the nose and brought him home with the winning run.

The Yankees protected their hold on first place by lining up their big guns behind some smart pitching by a pair of recruits, Russell Van Atta and Don Brennan, and cleaning up the Boston Red Sox in a doubleheader, 11 to 2 and 8 to 3.

Sav Cling to Place. Chicago's White Sox cling to their second place tie with Washington, when Paul Gregory held the Cleveland Indians to six hits to win 3-1. The Detroit Tigers and St. Louis Browns broke even, the Browns taking the opener, 11-8, and Detroit second, 8-1.

The Braves beat the Giants twice, 3-0 and 8-4. Pittsburg regained the lead by walking roughly over the weakened Cincinnati Reds, 8-1.

The Brooklyn Dodgers gave the Phillies their fifth straight licking, 6-3. Rogers Hornsby, coming back to Chicago for the first time since he was ousted as club manager last August, played an important part in gaining an even break for the St. Louis Cardinals in a long doubleheader. The Cubs pounded out a 7-5 victory in the opener, but the Rajah evened it by passing a homer with one on in the third inning of the nightcap and paving the way for a 5-3 Cardinal victory.

FISHING OPENS IN NORTH CALIFORNIA. YREKA, Cal., May 1.—(Sp.)—With the trout season opening today fishermen of northern California are busy panning trips to their favorite waters. Fly fishing will probably not be at its best in most Siakiyou waters according to Game Warden Bruce Hammock. The present warm weather is melting the snow rapidly causing most of the smaller streams to become riley.

Mr. Hammock said that the upper Klamath river and the upper Shasta river would probably furnish the best fly fishing, while bass fishing would probably be fair in many of the other streams.

Breaver creek, Kelsey creek and Canyon creek will be closed until June 16, while Horse creek, Clear creek and the Shasta river from the dam to its mouth are closed through the entire season. CALLISON CONFIRMED AS OREGON GRIDIRON COACH

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—The appointment of Alonzo L. Stiner as head football coach of Oregon State college for 1934 was confirmed at a meeting of the state board of higher education here Saturday. Frank Callison was also confirmed to continue at University of Oregon.

The new Oregon State mentor has been assistant football coach at the Corvallis college since 1928 and has just completed his fifth season at the school. He is a graduate of University of Nebraska, where he played at left tackle on the varsity in 1925

and was captain and right tackle in 1928. Stiner, 30 years old, will be the youngest coach in the coast conference.

As the result of the retrenchment policy of the state board of higher education each coach will receive \$5500 a year with cut, the amount to be received being actually \$4415 per annum. Also the appointments are on a year to year basis with no contracts. This is in contrast to the \$11,500 received yearly by Dr. Clarence Spears, formerly coach at University of Oregon.

sity of Oregon singles winner, Deuel, kept to sale, allotting Brown four games in the third straight set win.
