twelve 35,000 and 50,000 troops, were received by the highest officials of the soviet government and of the communist party from the top of the venerated tomb of Lenin. Chancellor Adolf Hitler changed the German May Day from a radical festival to a great celebration honoring the German working man. The Berlin celebration centered in the Lustgarten, where in the past there have been bloody clashes between demonstrators and the police. Peru was under a state of siege as the result of the assassination yesterday of President Sanchez Cerro by a revolutionary. In Madrid police fired into the air several times to break up a demonstration by 1000 communists before the ministry of war. A few persons were injured. Vienna saw a great military show of strength by the new dictatorial Dollfus regime. Streets were strung with barbed wire and machine guns were mounted at strategic points. Some 200 persons were arrested.
