Seventeen Hits Chalked Up In Defeating Phils, 10-0, In Opener—Young Indian Hurler Stops Sox, 8 to 1

The east has taken one glance at George Gibson's Pittsburgh Pirates and promptly hoisted storm warnings.

Moving into the Atlantic seaboard, the Buccaneers rattled 17 hits off the fences of Baker bowl yesterday, trounced their old jinx, the Phils, 10-1, and strengthened their grip on the National league lead.

All in all, Gibson's men gave an impressive demonstration of the strength many competent critics believe will take the Pirates into the world series next fall.

Cleveland's victory left the Washington Senators holding second place in the American league all by themselves, and dropped the White Sox into a tie with the Indians for the third rung.

FISHING LICENSE MORATORIUM AIM OF PETITIONERS

Petitions asking for a moratorium on fishing licenses are in circulation in Jackson county and will be forwarded Governor Meier this week, it was announced today by Sherman Waer, leader of the move to give destitute people this means of replenishing larders.

The petitions already carry 1000 signatures and ask that either a moratorium be declared or special fishing permits be granted needy persons.

Persons employed on a part time basis would also benefit from such a program by spending their non-working days on the various streams in southern Oregon, obtaining additional food, the petitioners state.

Immediate action in the matter is desired as the fishing season is very good at this time on the Rogue and other streams.

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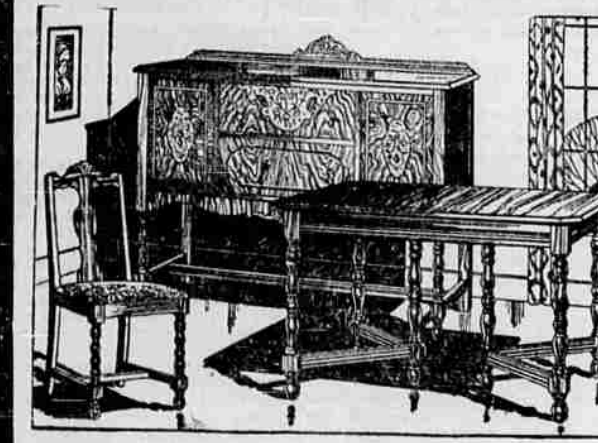
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
