were blocked because McNary would not stand for it. He had lived too long to cut off his nose for spite.

It may seem like a shame to eastern Republicans that the western Liberals lie under their banner. But there is no experienced cool-headed politician in Washington who does not realize that the future of the Republican party rests on winning back the west.

Most impartial observers are believing the new Federal Associates are playing right into the hands of the Democrats.

The confidential figures of the Democratic high command show they will not be surprised to lose 70 house seats in the next election.

This figure was arrived at by Mr. Farley's expert statistician. He took election returns for every off-year election since the civil war. He found that the party in power always lost after winning the presidency. He averaged those losses and applied the average to the existing Democratic strength in the house.

Even if it works out that way Democrats would still control the house by 37 votes. Republicans can gain control only if they win 95 seats. That is a big order.

The Republicans are having a hard time getting anyone to lay money on the barrelhead in these days.

The national committee may close up within a month, leaving only a corporate committee. Sanders of the 'which' ex-Vice President Curtis withdrew, also is in financial straits. Chollie was supposed to get a large salary but it did not materialize. His sister Dollie was supposed to round up \$100,000 in material. So Chollie and Dollie have retired to the Shoreham building. There the hidden Republican clan daily gathers. Leading the crowd are former Secretary of War Hurley, who owns the building, and Lawrence Kichey, former secretary to Mr. Hoover. Charles Sanders of the national committee is becoming nicely from a hospital operation.

The Roosevelt price-boosting program was nearly ruined by its best friend. Leading offender was its father-in-law—only Sen. Thomas of Oklahoma. His untamed remarks caused an inner upheaval in the Democratic cloakroom.

The Democrats were trying to show that the program was not so inflating as it sounded. Unquestionably they were correct. It is conservatively administered. If inflation will be largely psychological.

Thomas thought it was the real thing and breathed fire upon it. Two bankers in the galleries nearly fainted when he predicted it would take two hundred billion of purchasing power away from the rich and give it to the poor.

They recovered when the recollection that perhaps there was not that much money in Heaven and earth combined.

In the secret conferences with MacDonald the president tried to get the British pound stabilized at \$4. This was obviously more than he expected to get. His minimum figures were \$3.50 for the pound and 85 cents for the dollar. Most of the conversation centered around a consulting party to help disarrange.

The Democratic platform pledges our cooperation in such a venture.

Mr. Roosevelt was quite successful in his little scheme to prevent MacDonald and Herriot from getting to his.

In order not to make it too obvious, he had them together socially but never together in a business conference. The result was that the French effort to get in on the British conference was fruitless.
