him. Banks visibly brightened after Attorney Hammerly started speaking, and conferred often with Attorneys Phipps and Enright. Mrs. Charles P. Moran, a sister of Banks, occupied a seat by Mrs. Banks Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Banks sat with bowed head most of the afternoon, in a very solemn mood, seldom lifting her eyes from the floor. The jury of six men and six women paid keen attention to both attorneys. The courtroom was full, with a large crowd in the hallway. The defense asked that all witnesses be excluded, leaving a large vacant space. Spectators were then admitted, as the court admonished. "Now don't let the whole town in, Mr. Judge," when court adjourned, the judge said, laughingly. "Don't let the spectators try to get out at once, or somebody might get hurt."

EDGAR D. ROSE DIES, AGED 84

Edgar Dewitt Rose passed away at a private hospital in Medford early Thursday morning after an illness since March. He was born at Syracuse, N. Y., May 28, 1848. His parents, Thomas D. and Emma Rose, migrated to Wabasha county, Kansas, in 1878. He studied law at Alma, Kas., and was admitted to the bar there. Mr. Rose came to the Rogue River coast in 1881 where he resided with his sister, Mrs. Ella J. Smith, at 721 Bennett avenue. He leaves one sister and brother, Mrs. Ella J. Smith and O. E. Rose, both residents of Medford. Funeral services will be held at the Peri Funeral Home Saturday at 2 p. m. Rev. W. H. Eaton officiating. Interment in Sixkiyou Memorial park cemetery.

RANGER STATION BUILDINGS ADDED

Work on the new buildings at the Star ranger station is progressing rapidly, according to reports from the Rogue River national forest headquarters here and it is expected the buildings will all be completed by mid-summer. The new barn that will shelter 20 horses is nearing completion and work will soon start on a storage shed. A hydraulic system which will lift water 150 feet from a spring to a 4000-gallon storage reservoir is nearly completed, officials said. Two ramia in series are being constructed to make the lift, which is unusual in this district. Besides being raised 150 feet, the water is carried about 750 feet distant from the spring. The water will supply the entire needs of the Star ranger station.

REVIEW TRAGEDY AT BANKS HOME AS TRIAL OPENS

Banks believed the door would be broken down. He viewed the officers as marauders. "Then, under the mental strain of many months, he fired. He couldn't see. But the bullet sped its way, and killed George Prescott." Attorney Hammerly, in his remarks, pictured Banks as "a fiery crusader, battling for the rights of the underdog" and "paying cash for the first time in the history of Jackson county for fruit, and saving \$800,000 a year for the small growers." He traced Banks' ancestry back to the Mayflower, and reviewed his life, from a young man in Ohio, until he was induced by a friend to make an investment in Rogue River valley. Mention of his father visily affected Banks. "Defendant Banks accumulated a considerable fortune by his fruit distributing business in Ohio—one of the largest agencies of its kind in the country. He lost everything in the panic of 1907. In the language of the street, he was 'wiped out completely.' "He knew the fruit business," continued Hamnerly. "He came to California. From 1910 to 1926, he transacted a business that totaled more than \$20,000,000. He was operating as an independent—buying for cash. He came in conflict with other interests, buying on assignments." The coming of Banks was outlined then by his counsel, to the Rogue river. He made an initial investment of \$25,000, the attorney said.

EX-KU KLUX AIDE RECEIVES PAROLE

ATLANTA, May 4.—(AP)—Governor Eugene Talmadge has paroled Philip E. Fox, of Dallas, Texas, former publicity representative of the Ku Klux Klan who was serving a life sentence for killing William G. Coburn, Atlanta lawyer, in the latter's office here in 1923. Coburn was shot to death as the result of a controversy within the Ku Klux Klan.
