Political conditions returned to normalcy again at the senior high school when 153 students went to the polls in last Friday's student body elections, and chose Noel Benson, prominent junior and 11-Times business manager, their president for the 1935-36 school year. Eve Benson Class In Talking Films Soon Says Ritter

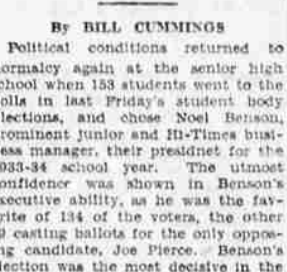
