WESTERN CLUBS SHOWING POWER IN MAJOR RACE

In the first 24 games of the campaign's initial east-west series, the invaders from beyond the Alleghenies have gained a 2-1 edge—18 victories against eight defeats—and this in the east's own strongholds. The west checked in with two more triumphs yesterday as the league-leading Pittsburgh Pirates blanked the Boston Braves behind Larry French's great pitching and the St. Louis Cardinals took the home run route in overcoming stubborn resistance from the New York Giants. The Pirates and Cards together have accounted for nine victories in 11 starts in the east. The Pirates walloped Tom Zachary for nine hits to win 3-0. The Cardinals made only three hits off Fred Fitzsimmons, but they beat the Giants, 4-3, on home runs by Joe Medwick and Frankie Frisch. EASTERN GOLFERS OUT OF TOURNEY

NEW YORK, May 9.—(AP)—The selection of Chicago as the venue of the 1933 national open golf championship was reflected today in a big decrease in eastern entries and a corresponding increase in competitors from the west, especially the Chicago district. A total of 913 golfers have entered this year as against 1013 in 1932 and a study of the sectional lists for the nation-wide qualifying round next Monday shows that the east can be charged entirely with this loss.
