

NEW IMPETUS FOR LUMBER INDUSTRY AS DOLLAR DROPS

Northwest Sees Growing Interest In Product In Argentine Market—Europe Also Talking Big Orders

SEATTLE, May 11.—(AP)—Increased value of the peso in comparison to the U. S. dollar today, was given credit by General Steamship Corporation representatives here for an added interest in Pacific northwest lumber by dealers in Argentine republic.

Inquiry has been stimulated in that market, which has been dormant for more than two years, because of the exchange situation, the steamship officials said. The rate for lumber delivery in that South American country has been advanced 50 cents a thousand board feet by the east coast of South America conference, the officers said, because of this new interest.

There also has been increased inquiry for lumber in Europe, they said, dealers who have been negotiating for lots of 20,000 now talking in terms of 80,000 to 100,000 feet.

Walter Barr, district manager of the Inter-Oceanic Shipping Corporation said today that both lumber and plywood to Europe are more active. Last month, he said, his firm loaded four vessels to capacity in the Pacific northwest and will have three full cargoes of lumber and plywood this month.

SEATTLE, May 11.—(AP)—Western lumbermen believe the little wooden school house is coming back. John B. Fitzgerald, economist of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, said today the American educational system is tottering for lack of intelligent building expenditures, and the timber industry offers a prop.

As obsolete school houses are abandoned or destroyed by storm, fire or earthquake, he said, they should be replaced by a new type of cheap wooden edifice.

"School buildings of the future need not be like the present white elephants, which become obsolete before the bonds that paid for them are retired," he said.

"These costly buildings with gigantic carrying charges, overhead and tied up investments are largely responsible for high taxes, low collections, unpaid teachers' salaries and closed schools.

"Here's the remedy which lumbermen and architects are offering: 'A one-story wooden building, built like a hollow square, many-windowed with heating plant outside, coating extremely little and having virtually no overhead.'"

PLANS FOR WOODS CAMPS COMPLETE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 11.—(AP)—Plans for establishing 90 forest camps in Oregon, each to be occupied by about 300 members of the civilian conservation corps, were completed here Tuesday with confirmation from Washington, D. C. The camps will be organized in national forests, reservations and state and private lands, giving employment to men now without work. The unemployed youth of the country will be given preference in the voluntary enlistment order.

There will be 65 camps on national forests, three on the Warm Springs Indian reservation, two in Crater Lake national park, 10 on Oregon and California land grant land, and 10 on state and private lands.

PUBLIC WORKS PLAN STUDIED

WASHINGTON, May 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt went into conference late today on the formulation of a public works-industrial control bill with members of his cabinet, congressional leaders and representatives of labor and industry. Senator Wagner (D., N. Y.) brought to the White House a draft of legislation combining a three billion dollar public construction program and government sanction of trade agreements with industries for wages, hours of labor and control of surplus production.

SHARP CRITICISM ON VET ECONOMY

WASHINGTON, May 11.—(AP)—Sharp-tongued remarks were made in the house today over the \$480,000,000 cut in veterans' expenditures, as the members took up the appropriation bill for all the government's independent offices, including the veterans' administration.

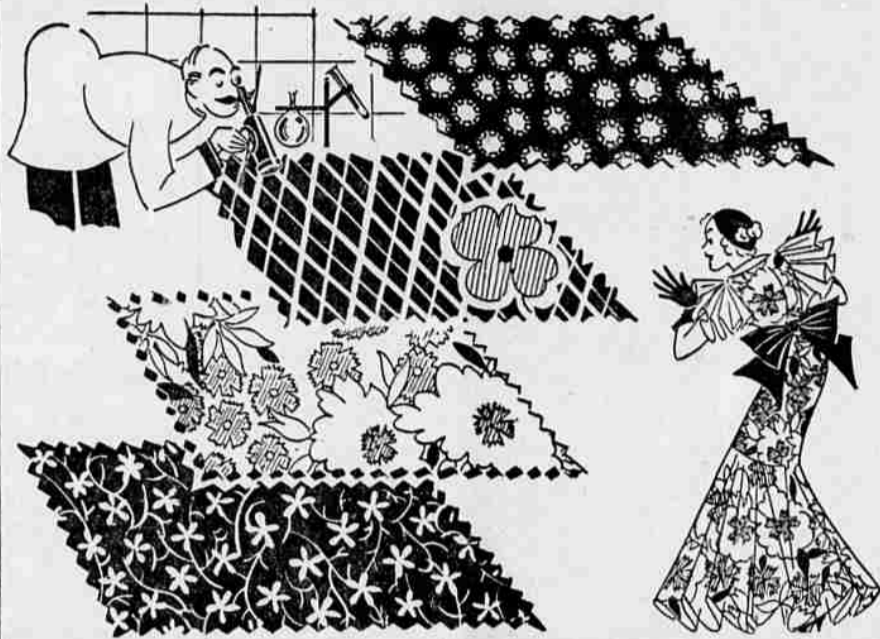

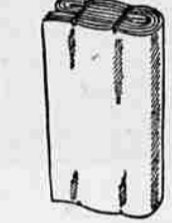
