Mr. and Mrs. Everett Skeeters have moved into the house owned by Steve Lunek.

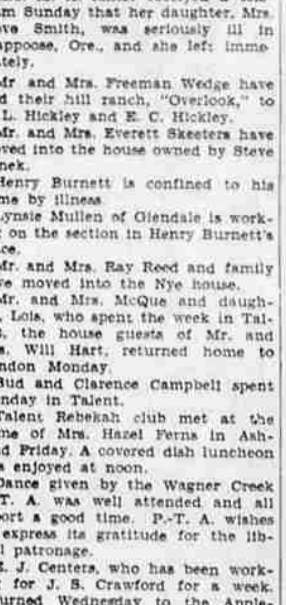
Henry Burnett is confined to his home by illness.
