BEAUTY BEYOND FANCY'S FLIGHT FILMED AT LAKE

"We put live men on skis into the pictures to prove the reality of many of the scenes to the public—their beauty we knew to be ever beyond the flight of imagination"—such was the description of Crater Lake given here Friday by Bruce Merman, Hollywood motion picture director, upon his return from the national park with his camera man, H. C. Gibbs.

The beauty of Crater Lake and the surrounding Oregon woods, wearing a cloak of snow, he explained, so far exceeded his greatest expectations that he couldn't expect people who have not seen to believe.

"We took three times as many pictures as we intended to when we came here," he added. "We were supposed to take 200 feet of film. We shot 600 feet. We couldn't get enough."

The pictures taken will be included in the Shasta Cascade Wonderland Travelogue showing at theaters throughout the United States. It will be a magna-color production and Crater Lake, mirroring in its own particular blue, the geological formations and snow banks which surround it, along with glorious cloud effects, will form the climax of the picture.

Messrs. Merman and Gibbs remained at Crater Lake since last Friday waiting for the storm to break and provide the necessary clearness needed for the scenes desired. Tuesday, with less than 20 minutes' warning, the sun came out and they went to work, and with the aid of the National Park rangers, without whom they could have accomplished nothing, they declared today they obtained pictures, which are going to amaze theater-goers with their beauty.

The services of the rangers and all park officials was praised again and again today by the motion picture men. The only troubles they encountered during the week's stay at the lake were brought on by the bears and slippery skis. One bear, who did not fancy his reflection in the glass of Merman's car, broke the door in and ended the displeasing imagery. "Spunky," the motion picture bulldog, got even with the bears later by staying on guard at the cook house meat supply.

Merman and photographer left for California Friday afternoon and will return to southern Oregon later in the season to photograph Crater Lake without winter covering. Other pictures for the travelogue will also be taken at that time, they reported to the Chamber of Commerce board of directors today.
