Ranks With Hagen, Sweeter. The ordinary players generally make the mistake of having their elbows too far out, swinging too loosely and straddling too far away from the ball.

The secret lies in the proper stance, about a half swing and a firm wrist. Strictly speaking, the shot is a short swing with the left hand. Try it with the left hand alone to get the idea. You do not follow all the way through because you hit the ball on the down swing and take turf.

One Club for Shags Hagen. The best method of practicing the mashie niblick shot is to try it from distances of 50 to 120 yards off the green, not just from one spot. Practice within this range will help your control, increase your confidence in the one club.

It is not wise to use three or four different clubs for short-range shots to the green. By governing the swing, it will be found good results will be accomplished over the range of distance I have specified.

The player who has his short game, his pitches and putting well under control, does not need to worry about being outdriven by his rival.

Let me point to Paul Runyan, as a fine example. This great young player does not hit a long ball off the tee, but he is a master shot-maker with two clubs, the spoon and the mashie niblick.

I consider him one of the best mashie niblick players I have ever seen, and that includes Walter Hagen and Jess Sweetser, two of the most famous specialists.
