Moody arose at this point and said, "I would like to call the court's attention to the fact that while Mrs. Banks testified that Prescott said no word at the door, both she and Mr. Banks testified they knew it was Prescott, an officer."

Moody also arose and put in his word. "If your honor please," he said, "the principals of law you have just outlined are applicable to the case. I say, however, that whether or not they knew he was an officer, the law is not changed."

Longer again renewed his motion for a directed verdict of dismissal against Banks and Mrs. Banks. The motion was overruled.
