

VETERAN AGED 86 ENJOYS SPORT OF CATCHING SALMON

GRANTS PASS, May 19.—(Spl.)—Honors of the fishing season should go to Scott W. Phillips, of Grants Pass, dean of Rogue River fishermen, not for the largest fish—but for his youthful enthusiasm and courage as a fisherman. Mr. Phillips, a Civil War veteran, in his 86th year, on Tuesday landed a salmon, without assistance, that weighed under thirty pounds. This is the second salmon he has caught this month. Mr. Phillips is one of the three survivors of the local G. A. R. post.

In spite of prevailing unpleasant weather conditions fishing on Rogue river adjacent to Grants Pass continues to improve. In proportion to the number of fishermen, the week-end catch of salmon was comparatively small, but on Monday a new run of salmon put in appearance in this section and good catches were made during Monday and Tuesday all along the river from Savage Rapids dam to Jump-off-tee. The fish are still averaging large, a number that were taken weighing over 30 pounds. With this late run, a number of "Jack" salmon have been seen, and fly fishermen are eagerly watching for the summer steelheads which generally make their appearance with the late salmon run. The fish are still high and cold, fly fishing for summer steelhead should begin early this season, any time after the middle of June on the upper river near Trail, Dodge bridge and Bybee bridge.

Trout fishing continues to improve, but because of high water in the Rogue and tributaries, is mostly done with salmon egg bait.

CRYSTAL SALT IS DEATH FOR COWS

GRANTS PASS, May 19.—(Spl.)—A costly lesson was driven home to dairymen and cattle raisers in this vicinity this week when A. L. Love of this city reported the loss of three head and the illness of one other as the result of feeding them crystal salt, the type used in ice-cream freezers.

Love gave his cows the salt one evening, and the next morning a calf and one of his best Guernsey cows, a five gallon animal, were dead. The third died shortly before noon, but veterinary service saved the life of a young steer which had also eaten the salt. The animal was very weak and sick Wednesday, but was said to be improving steadily.

This experience was related by Love in order that other men in charge of cattle will not make the same mistake. The crystal salt is very deadly to clove-hoof animals of any sort, and the loss of blooded stock by Love proves the statement.

SCHOOL DISPLAY IN C. C. WINDOW

An interesting display, illustrating the work carried on in the Medford schools by the classes in architectural drawing occupies a window of the Chamber of Commerce this week. The display was arranged by the instructor, Leland Mentzer, who also directed the construction of the Turnbow house, just off South Oakdale, completed by the boys of the class.

AUTO ACCIDENTS SHOW DECREASE

SALEM, May 19.—(AP)—A decrease in automobile accidents, injuries and fatalities during April of this year as compared with the same period in 1932, of more than 21 per cent was reported today by the secretary of state.

Fatalities for the past month totaled 15 as compared to 19 the year before. Persons injured totaled 281 as compared to 356 in 1932. Total number of accidents reported in Oregon for that period was 1,436 as compared to 1,833.

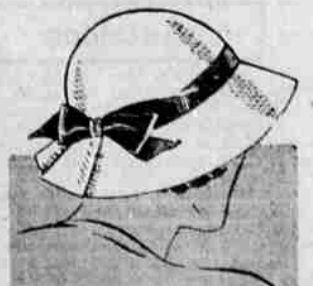
