

ODD FELLOWS TO MAKE TILLAMOOK CONVENTION CITY

PENDELTON, May 19 — (AP) —

George Winslow of Tillamook was elected grand master of the Oregon lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and Tillamook was selected as next year's convention city, at yesterday's concluding session of the annual convention.

Charles Pool of Eugene was elected deputy grand master, and F. M. Sexton of The Dalles was chosen as grand warden. E. E. Sharon of Portland was named grand secretary; G. W. Houck of Portland, grand trustee of the lodge home, and F. L. Hubbard was elected grand trustee of the endowment fund.

The election of grand warden was the most earnestly contested incident in the balloting. Those nominated were Sexton, George Houck of Portland, Ralph Russell of Roseburg, and A. W. Foster of Portland.

The new officers were installed. Eight hundred lodgemen enjoyed a cowboy breakfast at the roundup arena with Eureka lodge of Pendleton as host.

Although it rained at times during the huge parade, this did not dampen the spirits of the hundreds of persons who participated, nor spoil the colorful features of the spectacle.

If so, you will enjoy wandering over the world looking for recipes suitable for home consumption and using ingredients you know and enjoy in this country. Some are particularly worthy of wider circulation, so we shall include a couple which are particularly worthy of it.

Washington Pie.

- 1 1/4 c flour
 - 2 t baking powder
 - 1/4 t salt
 - 1 t vanilla
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 cup powdered sugar
 - 1-3 cup water
- Sift flour, baking powder and salt together three times; beat eggs, add sugar gradually and beat well, then add part of the flour mixture and alternate with water; finally, add the vanilla and pour into two round cake tins, 35 minutes at 325 degrees.

- Filling.**
- 1 cup milk, scalded, add
 - 1 egg, well beaten with
 - 2 t granulated sugar
 - 2 t cornstarch
 - 2 t milk
 - 1/4 t vanilla
 - 1/2 t lemon extract

Stir constantly until smooth and thoroughly cooked, then pour on one layer of the "pie" and cover with the other layer; sprinkle powdered sugar or spread strawberry jam on top.

George Washington Nut Pie.

- 3 egg yolks, beaten
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1 cup dark "Karo"
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup coconut
- 1 t vanilla
- 1/2 t salt
- 3 egg whites, beaten

Mix well and fold in beaten egg whites last; bake in uncooked shell at 450 degrees for 25 minutes and at 325 degrees for 25 minutes.

Mary's Oatmeal Cookies.

- Canada.**
- 1 1/2 cups oatmeal
 - 2 eggs, beaten

- 1 T sugar
 - 1 T molasses
 - 1/2 t baking powder
 - 1 t vanilla
 - 1 T melted butter
 - Pinch of salt
- Mix well and let stand 20 minutes, then drop on greased cookie sheet and bake 10 minutes at 400 degrees.

Banbury Tarts.

England.

Fill three-cornered squares of pie crust with the following:

- Chop fine—
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup currants
- 4 figs
- 1/4 cup walnuts
- 4 T orange juice
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 T flour
- 2 T water

Cook raisins, currants and figs in double boiler 20 minutes, then add orange juice; mix flour and sugar together, add to first mixture and cook 20 minutes longer; remove from range and stir in nuts.

Bread Pudding.

Portugal.

- 1 loaf of bread (1 1/2 lb.) cut in small pieces, and cover with
- 1 pint of scalded milk; soak 1/2 hour, mash and add
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups sweet wine
- 6 egg yolks, beaten slightly
- 1/2 cup raisins

Mix well, pour into buttered baking dish and powder with flour; bake

in slow oven (325 deg.) about 45 minutes.

Peanut Cake.

- Brazil.**
- 4 cups ground peanuts
 - 1-3 c sugar
 - 2 1/2 cups flour
 - 4 eggs, well beaten
- Mix all ingredients and knead well; form into cakes and bake in hot oven on greased tins.

Goloubtzy.

Russian.

- 1 1/2 lb. steak
- 1/4 lb. suet
- 1/4 lb. rice (1/2 c.)
- 1 medium cabbage
- 2 cups tomatoes
- 1 1/2 cups sour cream
- 1 medium onion
- 1/4 lb. butter
- Four
- 2 cups bouillon
- 1 cup water

Salt and pepper to taste.

Cook rice in double boiler, with three times as much water, until tender and each grain remains separate; put meat through grinder very fine and mix with rice; remove leaves from cabbage and cut away hard portion, then sprinkle with salt and pepper; place a tablespoon of the meat-rice mixture on each leaf and roll up carefully, tucking ends in so that filling will not fall out in cooking. (The if you wish) Roll each "goloubtzy" in flour and place together in skillet; pour melted butter over them and cook on top of range, turning occasionally so that they will be

browned on all sides; remove from skillet and make sauce from remaining butter, onions, flour, tomatoes, sour cream and liquids, seasoning to taste; place the "goloubtzy" in a deep dish and cover with the sauce; bake in oven 15 minutes at 350 deg. Solanka.

Kraut, cook and drain.

- Fry onions in butter
- Puree of tomatoes
- Olives
- Capers
- Cooked fish.

(Your own idea of proportions is considered correct.)

Combine all, put in baking dish, sprinkle with cheese and buttered crumbs; bake in oven, uncovered, for 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

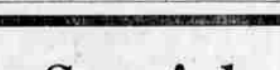
