

MOST CONVICTS LESS EDUCATED SURVEY PROVES

SALEM, May 18—(AP)—A comparison of the percentage of men committed to the state penitentiary are without high school education; a survey by Mathew B. Thompson, principal-elect of Sweet Home union high school, disclosed.

Records of 800 consecutive male commitments to the Oregon penitentiary from January 1, 1929 to March 1932, were studied by Thompson in connection with research work at Willamette university.

The prisoners' declarations of years spent in school were used.

Previous surveys have shown prisoners inclined to over state rather than under state the years of schooling, said Thompson.

From his study of educational and age groups in relation to the total number and the classification of the crimes committed, Thompson made the following observations:

"The great mass of commitments comprised men with only a grade school education—68 per cent."

"Generally speaking, the figures demonstrated that the more education, the less crime."

"No particular age or educational groups seem to lead in homicides."

"The preponderance of crime was committed against property."

"Adolescents excepted, young men committed more violent crimes, proportionately are in actual numbers, than older men."

"There seems to be a 'dangerous age' of men over 40 for sex crimes—38 per cent of sex crimes were in this group."

"Many over 40 were quite old and evidently foreign born."

"The higher the educational status the less violent the crime."

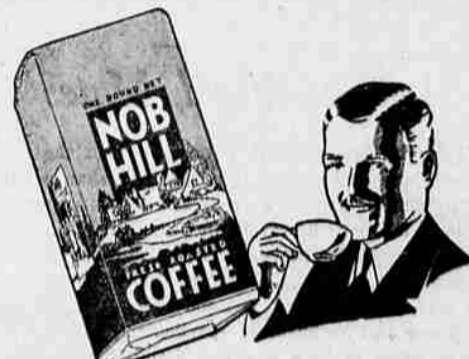
