Irene Hampton, Concert Pianist, Is Visitor Here

Irene Hampton, of New York City, who has been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe C. Brown, left for New York Thursday evening. It was a matter of real regret to all her friends that her brief stay did not permit her to yield to many urgent requests that she appear in concert here.

It will without doubt, be of real interest to all music lovers of the valley to know that Irene Hampton is recognized as one of the leading concert pianists of New York City. Also, that she has won the most unique distinction as an exponent of Spanish and South American music, having so excelled in this art that she is acclaimed by Spanish musicians the outstanding American interpreter of their music. In recognition of this accomplishment, when the Guatemala-Mexico-Symphony orchestra appeared last winter at Town hall, in New York City, Irene Hampton was chosen as sole accompanist to this most unique presentation. This musical organization is the only one of its kind in the world.

She has also been presented several times under the auspices of the famous Pan-American Women's association, in New York, Washington and Schenectady, from which cities she has broadcast on many occasions over WGY, the international broadcast to Europe and South America. Her appearances in many joint concerts with the famous Spanish harpiste, Leopold Godal, have brought her into most favorable prominence with the musical milieu of the metropolis. Her latest presentation under the auspices of the association was at the Roerich museum, the well-known international art center. Her brilliant concert at Carnegie hall, dealing with the great masters, was one of the most notable events of her career.

Like Portland, Medford folks too, greet with pride and deepest appreciation their own who have become recognized artists of the highest quality in the great cultural centers. And Irene Hampton's recent visit has left people with the fervent wish that they also may soon enjoy the rare privilege of hearing her in concert here.
