

# Speed and Thrills Promised in Outboard Regatta This Afternoon

## DARING DRIVERS OF COAST HERE FOR BIG EVENT

### Action Promised From First to Last Flag in Annual Emigrant Meet Staged by Southern Oregon Club

The roar of outboard motors will resound through valleys and echo from hills in the vicinity of Emigrant lake today as the Pacific coast's fastest puddle jumpers swing into action in the annual Emigrant lake regatta at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Speed and thrills, high class driving, spills and victories will spice the afternoon from the first starting flag until the last checked flag has been flashed. The Southern Oregon Boat Club has staged an annual regatta for several years. Race officers have indicated this year's races will be the best so far.

Noted Pilots Entered. Today's races will be the climax to many years of competition in the past, as many of the racers have pocketed, crowded and spilled each other in past races from San Francisco to Seattle. Drivers who will be seen in action include Ward Angilley of Marysville, Wilbur of Sacramento, Richard of Spokane, McCoy of Vancouver, Plue of Portland, Joe Meyer and Heinie Fluhrer of Medford and many others.

Five classes of boats will race, the class B, C, D, F, and runabout. Class F is open to the largest motors built, and entries have been received from many. Boats in class F attain the speed of 60 miles an hour, and on the hazardous Emigrant lake course, the boat that stays right side up is expected to win.

Seventeen entries have been received in class C races, including Angilley, Wilbur, Richard, McCoy, Plue and Meyer.

Runabouts Last. Adolph Spreckles, prominent California sportsman, will enter the runabout race, the last race on the program. This race will be featured by unknown racers, besides many well known drivers, and as runabout racing is fast coming to the front as the cream of outboard motor racing, the event will provide a fitting climax to the day's program.

A giant loud speaker, arranged by Herman Purucker, will keep the crowd informed as to the entrants, winners and victims of spills, and beer will be served to the thirsty. The races will start, rain or shine, officers of the boat club said, and cars will be parked so the races can be seen from cars, in case it rains. Emigrant lake is reached from the Pacific highway, south of Ashland, and adequate signs have been posted on the highway to insure fans reaching the lake. Emigrant lake is four miles south of Ashland.

## WASHINGTON HIGH WINS TRACK MEET

HAYWARD FIELD, Eugene, Ore., May 20.—(AP)—Washington high school won the Oregon interscholastic track and field championship here today in a meet that saw five old records fall by the wayside. Washington, led by Brady and Brack, scored 49 1/2 points. McCaughey of Brookings won the Paul Starr permanent trophy for high point man with 10 points, and led his school to second place with a total of 19 1/2 points. Brady set a new 220-yard dash mark of 21.8 seconds. Spill, also of Washington, broke the 440-yard run record with a new time of 31.4 seconds.

## MEDFORD TO INVAD EAGLE POINT TODAY FOR PRACTICE GAME

Medford's baseball team will journey to Eagle Point today for a preliminary practice game. The local toppers have defeated the cheese-makers on two previous occasions so far this season and Manager Hoffman of the Eagle Pointers is out for revenge.

Weather permitting many local fans will make the trip to get a line on the two teams, both of which are members of the newly organized Southern Oregon league.

Charles Fritchett, recently signed pitcher, will be the starting choice for Medford with George Harrington receiving, while Loomis and Ivan Harrington will form the battery for Eagle Point.

Manager Harold Haight had the local squad out for workouts Thursday and Friday at the fairgrounds. A large number of players were on hand fighting for positions on the team. Practice every Tuesday, Thursday and Friday will continue until the opening of the regular season June 4, when Roseburg plays here in the initial game of the Southern Oregon league. On the same date Eagle Point journeys to Coquille, while Ashland goes east to Klamath Falls.

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## DRIVERS' EXAMS TO BE SPEEDED BY ADDED FORCE

Owing to the large crowds applying for original operators licenses and renewals, the examining personnel has been increased from two examiners to seven for this scheduled stop. However, the chief examiner, Ward Reynolds, has announced that beginning Monday, there will be two examiners in the city hall daily as long as they are required to handle the applicants, so that Medford residents will be able to apply any day except Sunday and holidays without having to wait unnecessarily long.

The chief examiner and two examiners will still maintain the regular schedule which is every other Friday and Saturday and on those regularly scheduled days, there will be four or five examiners to give the public service.

There seems to have been considerable misunderstanding as to taking the examination. The last legislature made it necessary for all old operator's licenses to be renewed by September 1st this year, it being impossible to examine 400,000 to 450,000 drivers by September 1st, those who have a clear record as to accidents and convictions for violations of traffic laws and those under 70 years of age and those who are physically and mentally normal can, after June 5, obtain an application, send it in with the fee of \$1 to the secretary of state and receive their new licenses in that manner. However, they may eventually be required to take an examination.

## FAIL TO AGREE AFTER 5 HOURS' DELIBERATION

All applications sent in after June 9th without an examination will be checked very carefully against past records and if found to be doubtful as to qualifications may be cited in for examination.

The bout between Frankie Monroe and Buzzsaw Zimmerman, as a main event at the armory next Wednesday night, will sound the opening gun of the southern Oregon lightweight tournament, according to Mack Lillard, promoter, who has been harboring plans for such a tournament for several months. The tourney will last until a lightweight champion of southern Oregon is definitely established, and will probably end in another bout between Herb White and Monroe, according to fans.

A "dark horse" in the tourney is Frank Jewett, former Medford fighter, who just finished a hitch in the navy, and who is back here looking for fights. He is scheduled to meet Spider Fields, and if he gets over Fields he will be in line for a crack at White. Fields and Jewett will fight Wednesday night on the Monroe-Zimmerman card.

Battling Beno will also meet Cliff Sparr, formerly of The Dalles. Sparr knocked up Beno, and Beno last appeared here against Jack McCarthy. Wednesday's card has all the earmarks of a knockout card, according to fight fans who have seen each fighter in action.

### Legion Meeting Monday Evening

Regular business meeting of the local American Legion post No. 15, will be held tomorrow evening at 8:00 o'clock in the Armory. It was announced Saturday by Commander Lee C. Garlock. Plans for decoration day will be completed at this meeting, he stated.

## Beer Brings Huge Sum For Treasuries of States

CHICAGO, May 20.—(AP)—Coffers of 33 state treasuries jingled today with an additional four and one-half million dollars collected in taxes since beer was legalized April 7. This includes complete figures for only three states. Seventeen states made incomplete returns. Seven others gave no figures on the income from beer taxes. The other 15 states do not yet permit the sale of beer.

The federal government collected \$9,139,687 in beer revenue during the 23 days of April that the brew sold legally. The \$4,500,000 collected by the states was in addition and brought the total beer taxes to \$13,642,479. To this figure must be added unestimated millions levied by counties and municipalities in license fees on distributors and retailers.

The federal taxes of \$5 a barrel netted \$8,299,052; licenses \$889,811 and wine \$824. Beer is sold legally in 33 states and the District of Columbia today. It becomes legal June 30 in Maine and August 10 in Nebraska. Seven states, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Maryland, Colorado, Wyoming and Minnesota, have not levied state taxes on beer.

## OREGON HUMBL ES STATE ATHLETES

EUGENE, May 20.—(AP)—Taking 11 first places while the visitors placed first in but three events, the University of Oregon track team defeated Oregon State College 84 1/2 to 49 1/2 on Hayward field here Friday.

One of the high points of the meet was the performance of Paul Starr, Oregon captain, who did the 220 yards in :20.9, which officials said may be the fastest time ever recorded in the Pacific northwest. Starr also tied the dual meet mark of :09.8 for the 100 yards.

Demaris, Oregon javelin expert, broke the previous dual meet record by hurling the spear 204 feet, 6 inches, or nine feet farther than the previous record-holder.

Moody followed at once and reviewed the case point by point. He waved the blood-stained warrant taken from Prescott's body as he told them the constable had a legal right to arrest Banks and even break into his home.

Point by point he accused the defense of perjured testimony and branded their four "eye witnesses" as liars.

"Of course we had to send to Medford for new witnesses to combat their testimony. How could we know that perjured testimony would be offered. When it was offered, we knew it to be untrue and we brought the people here who could prove the truth."

Lies Are Cited. "Four eye witnesses claim they stood in front of the door and saw a gun in Prescott's hand yet each says he saw no one else on the street. Do the defense attorneys expect the jury to believe that?" Moody asked.

Charles Hardy and Lonergan were attacked by Moody for introducing side-issues into the case. "I should have kept the alienists here to examine the defense attorneys for insanity. They should know as well as we do that these issues have nothing to do with the case," Moody said.

"But of course," he added, "Dr. Joseph would have declared them only temporarily insane and would have said they're all right now, so perhaps it is just as well."

Lonergan warned Lonergan, who has bitterly attacked "Copco" in his arguments, was in turn accused by Moody of being a power trust lawyer.

"But I've reformed," Lonergan interposed from the table and the judge had to warn the defense lawyer against interrupting.
