RUSH ORDER FOR CAMP LUMBER IS SUPPLIED BY O-O

Owen, manager of the Owen-Oregon Sales company, who announced that the local company has been awarded contracts for furnishing 140,000 feet of lumber to the government for construction of civilian conservation corps camp buildings in California. The contract was awarded, Mr. Owen stated, with a two days' limitation for fulfillment and the planing mill at the Owen-Oregon plant was operating Tuesday night for the first night season in two years to fill the order. Wednesday night the 140,000 feet of lumber will move from Medford south. It had been cut up into lengths to form the portable buildings to be used in the California camps.

The show, according to new arrangements will be held June 7th and 8th at the high school gymnasium. The change was announced by Miss Helen Carlson following the meeting of the committees at the home of Mrs. H. D. McCauley.

When Garden club members realized that all efforts to control "high" and "low" in atmospheric pressure were futile, they decided to push the date forward, letting the weather have its way as usual. Miss Carlson stated this morning.

The show will open at 8 o'clock the afternoon of June 7th and will remain open through Wednesday evening and all day Thursday.

Superintendent E. H. Hedrick has granted the club use of the gymnasium for these dates although school will be closed by then.

The club members feel sure that roses and other flowers will be blooming abundantly by the seventh of June and are anticipating a show up to the established standard for southern Oregon flower fancies.

VETERANS URGED TO WEAR POPPIES FRIDAY, SATURDAY

All world war veterans of Medford were urged to pay honor to their fallen comrades by wearing a memorial poppy on Friday and Saturday, May 26th and 27th, in a message issued today by Lee Gaston, commander of post 15 of the American Legion. Commander Gaston declared that the wearing of the poppy is the individual way to show remembrance for the war dead and devotion to the ideals for which they gave their lives. The message stated:

"On Friday and Saturday, May 26th and 27th, America will pay its annual tribute to the men who gave their lives in defense of the country in 1917 and 1918 by wearing the memorial poppy. I am sure that every world war veteran and all other patriotic citizens of Medford will wear this token of remembrance on that day. Wearing the poppy means that we have not forgotten our comrades who fell amid the poppies of France and that we are carrying on for America in their spirit.

The poppies will be offered on the streets here by the women of the American Legion Auxiliary, our wives, mothers, sisters and daughters. They have volunteered for this work, giving their services without the thought of personal gain. Disabled veterans have made the poppies at the U. S. Veterans' hospital in Portland. The contributions received from the sale of the red paper poppies will go entirely to the relief work of the needy veterans and their families. Be sure not only to wear a poppy on poppy day, but be sure to wear an American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary poppy."
