**TRAFFIC ARRESTS MEAN SENTENCES TO VIEW SCENERY**

There are going to be a lot of "arrests" made in Medford this summer for traffic violations, at least that is the implication contained in little slips, printed by the chamber of commerce. With an official heading of the police department the slips, which will be left in many cars, have all the appearance of the forwarding tags that traffic cops leave.

They read, however, close examination reveals: "We take this opportunity to welcome you to our city; also to remind you that you have violated the traffic ordinance by... The blank will be filled by members of the publicity committee, who will name whatever offenses they choose.

The penalties prescribed are as follows: Trip to Jacksonville, trip to Crater Lake, trip to Lake of the Woods or Diamond Lake, trip to Oregon Caves.

"We are sure you will find this penalty a real pleasure, and when completed, kindly submit this slip to the Medford Chamber of Commerce and it will represent your release." ... the slip states in conclusion.

**HIT RUN CHARGE FILED ON NELSON**

A formal charge of failure to halt and give assistance following an auto accident, was filed late yesterday by the district attorney's office against W. G. Nelson, truck operator and foreman for the Central Point cut-off construction. Bond was fixed at \$1500 pending action of the next grand jury.

Nelson is charged with running down Flagman Balze Tuesday night, when traveling at an excessive rate of speed and when he ignored his orders to stop. Balze sustained a broken pelvic bone and leg and other injuries. His condition was reported as improving. Internal injuries were feared, but did not develop, physician's report.

Following the accident Nelson was arrested in the western section of the city. State police reported that the bumper and one light of his car had been removed.

was believed to be suffering from no serious ill effects from his days and nights of exposure.

**Study Strain Blamed**

Conner is in the graduating class and officials believed that the strain of final examinations was the cause of his disappearance. Army officers said he left a note behind him saying he was going absent without leave but they would not comment on police information the note threatened suicide.

Officers said today that Conner was in good condition but probably would be kept in the hospital for several days. They said that because of high scholastic standing he would be graduated with his class despite the time he has lost.

"Tremendously happy," they said, over the safe return of their son, Mr. and Mrs. Guy W. Conner of this city today awaited further word of the circumstances of the disappearance and return of Cadet John S. Conner, honor student at West Point military academy.

"We are tremendously happy," Conner said tonight told the Mail Tribune. Neither he nor Mrs. Conner, he said, had believed that the boy would take his own life as had been indicated in a note reputedly found in his room, but he declared that nevertheless, "we are immeasurably relieved."

Had the boy not been found yesterday, Conner said, a member of the family would have left here last night for West Point to be at the scene of the search. The trip will not be made now, he said, because of ample assurance that their son's condition is satisfactory.

Late yesterday the Conners received a message from their son saying "Everything all right. Will write soon. Love to all. John." The West Point commandant telegraphed that young Conner had been found "in excellent condition, considering that he had been in the woods without food since disappearance. Now in hospital taking nourishment."
