

BUTTER AND EGGS HOLDING FIRM ON PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26.—(AP)—Butter prices continued unchanged, with no letup in the demand for quality stock to go into storage.

The demand for butterfat, too, appeared to be keenly firm, with prices withstanding the recent drop in butter.

Market for eggs continued to reflect a generally steady tone locally. There was no change of price here for the day. Receipts were about holding their own.

Small lift in hen prices is suggested in late trading as a result of continued shortage of offerings. A general rise in the buying price was being forecast.

Very good demand was showing for dressed turkeys with hens taking the great bulk of the call, both locally and for shipping. Prices were firm and generally up to 16c for tops.

First raspberries of the season were received from California. Two crates of 12 trays were priced at \$2.25 crate.

Market for strawberries showed more or less uncertainty for the California offerings with quality poor to very good. Tops were generally listed \$1.85-1.90 for 24s with Fresno 20s around \$1.50. Oregon stock was still of indifferent quality.

A car of cantaloupes was unloaded during the day. It was from Imperial valley and of good quality. Prices were perhaps 50c crate below initial offerings. Demand fair.

Notes of wholesale trading: Asparagus was steady to a trifle lower.

Dresses and Lashish lettuce was in better supply, price easier. Old and new onions were steady to firm.

Country killed meats were unchanged generally. Hothouse tomatoes were again lower with increasing stocks.

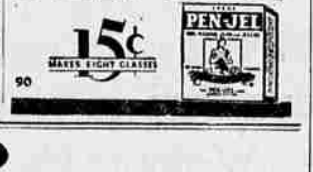
An airplane designed by John Wagner of Portland, Ore., has the wing placed partly over the propeller to increase the lift by utilizing the current the propeller produces.
