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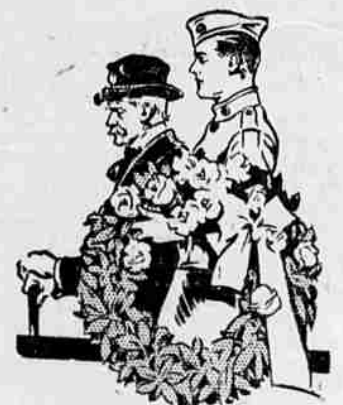

## Lest We Forget



The Standard Encyclopedia says: Memorial Day is a day set apart for decoration of the graves of soldiers who fell in the Civil War, and for the holding of commemorative exercises. This observance originated in the Southern states. In 1868 General John A. Logan, of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued a general order setting aside the 30th of May for the purpose of stretching flowers on the graves of old soldiers and for such exercises as local posts may direct. It is now customary, both north and south, to follow this custom regardless of the side on which they fought. Credit for this beautiful courtesy belongs to the women of the South.

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
