

### NEW TEAM NAME, CEREMONY, PRIZES FOR BALL OPENER

The Medford baseball team will be known as the "Rogues" in the future, is the announcement by Hal Haight, manager. The new name was the choice of Manager Haight and W. A. Bolger, president of the chamber of commerce and the secretary of the chamber, A. H. Banwell, as well as the sporting editor of the Mail Tribune and other local fans consulted in the choice of a name for the outfit.

Vern H. Sparks of 824 Summit avenue, who wrote a letter suggesting the name, will receive a season's pass to all games.

Ceremonies for the game between the Roseburg Vets and the Medford Rogues, who meet in the opening game of the Southern Oregon league at the fairgrounds, June 4th, are being arranged. According to present plans, Mr. Bolger will pitch the first ball, and Mayor E. M. Wilson, will endeavor to hit it, if it comes anywhere near the plate, while Joseph Pilegel, exalted ruler of the Elks, will endeavor to catch it.

The mayor does pull a Babe Ruth, and knock it out of the park. Court Hall, president of the newly organized league, will decide whether the pitch was a ball or a strike, and settle any disputes that may arise between the players.

An effort will be made to stage a short parade through the downtown section before the game.

Interest is being shown by local merchants and fans in the opening game and plans are being made to take care of one of the largest crowds ever to attend a baseball game here.

### LAKE STEAMER ON REEF ROLLS OVER; PASSENGERS SAFE

HOUGHTON, Mich., May 28.—(Sunday)—(AP)—Reports reaching here at 12:30 a. m. today said that the passenger steamer George M. Cox, which went aground on Rock of Ages reef near Isle Royale in Lake superior early Saturday evening, had rolled over and sunk.

Captain M. L. Gilbert, manager of the Isle Royale Transit company, owners of the vessel, said that George M. Cox, president of the company, and two women, were aboard the freighter Tremaine en route to Port Arthur, Ont. The two women whose names were not reported, were said to have been injured. The extent of their injuries was not learned.

The crew and the passengers were reported safe on Rock of Ages reef. The reports of the disaster were received here in fragmentary form by wireless from ships in the vicinity. Officials of the line here said that there were about 125 persons aboard the George M. Cox. They said the vessel's wireless ceased to be heard about 9 p. m. Saturday evening. It had been reported earlier that the craft went aground at 8 p. m.

As far as could be learned there were no fatalities.

### TEXTILE WORKERS END WAGE STRIKE

MANCHESTER, N. H., May 27.—(AP)—Textile workers voted 3 to 1 today to accept the proposals of manufacturers and return to work in the mills next Wednesday with a 15 per cent increase in pay and other considerations. A total of 466 of the 7600 textile workers in the city who had been on strike voted.

LOWELL, Mass., May 27.—(AP)—More than 1500 striking shoe workers will return to work Monday in four factories as the result of agreements signed today between manufacturers and representatives of the shoe workers protective union.

The agreements featured a ten per cent increase in wages and recognition of the union.

Five other factories, two of which have left the city, have yet to sign the agreements. The plants employed about 1800 more men.
