McLARNIN WINS TITLE WITH KAYO FOR CORBETT IN OPENING ROUND

DOPE IS UPSET BY CHALLENGER IN FEW SECONDS. Champ Stays On Canvas After Third Knockdown - Crowd Stunned by Sudden Climax - Promoters Lose

LOS ANGELES, May 30.—(AP)—Less than three minutes after he went into the ring to box for the welterweight title, Jimmy McLarnin trounced his first challenger, Lou Corbett III in the first round last night and immediately went into his handkerchiefs. A crowd of approximately 20,000 amazed men and women sat in Wrigley Field, the Los Angeles baseball park, and saw the challenger batter the champion with two rights and three lefts, all perfect hits, just before the end of the round. The bout lasted only two minutes and 37 seconds.

Puzzled At First Corbett's deceptive southpaw style puzzled his opponent at the outset and Jimmy had done nothing to pave the way for his devastating attack when it came. Suddenly a terrific McLarnin right hand landed flush on Corbett's jaw. The champion went down. He was not badly hurt and instantly followed the count as Referee George Blake lifted and lowered his hand. At nine, he shook his head and leaped to his feet.

From a neutral corner, his smile replaced by a grim look of determination, sped McLarnin. As the titleholder lifted his hands, a looping left slipped through, and as he staggered, two more left hooks followed with lightning-like rapidity. Corbett went down again and McLarnin again trotted to a corner.

Out On Feet This time the Fresno lad did not follow the count but instinctively rose to his feet at eight. He was dazed and almost out. As McLarnin charged in, the champion was half turned and a right sent him sprawling through the ropes, half out of the ring. There was no count. None was needed. Everybody knew the bout was over. Blake pushed McLarnin aside, and with the same motion of his hand lifted his glove proclaiming a new champion.

The fight made several records. It was the first time Corbett had been knocked out and only his third defeat in 76 bouts. It was also McLarnin's first victory over a southpaw. He had fought but one—Lou Brouillard—and lost the decision to him last year.

Title Seen Lost Corbett had held the championship only three months and a week, winning from Jackie Fields in San Francisco in San Francisco on Washington's birthday.

'Iron Man' Dan O'Leary Bows to Toll of Years

LOS ANGELES, May 30.—(AP)—A human machine who knew no fatigue, Dan O'Leary lay dead today under the eyes of a physician who marvelled for years at his endurance. Walker extraordinary, Dan O'Leary expected to live to the age of 120 years, but disease and natural toll of age struck him down yesterday in a Los Angeles hotel where he was spending the winter, still short of 92 years.

Death was due to hardening of the arteries. He scorned steady attention of a doctor, in spite of a developing tumor on his hip, but ten days ago he admitted that his finely coordinated muscles perhaps needed the aid of a physician. He called in a doctor in San Francisco on Washington's birthday.

If boxing history repeats itself, smiling Jimmy will find it was easier to win the belt than to keep it. The last five monarchs of the division have reigned only briefly. Young Jack Thompson, Tommy Freeman, Lou Brouillard and Jackie Fields were barely shoved off the throne when they were shoved off.

After the championship had changed hands, Corbett revealed that the last events of the evening were only a blur. "I don't know what happened," he said. "I don't know how he hit me, or what I did after that."

Corbett's guarantee was \$35,000 while McLarnin fought for 2 1/2 per cent of the receipts.

The boxoffice count showed only \$30,400 so McLarnin won the title but no money. The promoters paid heavily to see the sensational bout.

Berkeley, Cal., May 30.—(AP)—Open proselyting of high school athletes was announced today as its future policy by the Big C society of the University of California. No comment from any Pacific coast conference official was immediately available as conference rules provide that members of athletic staffs or employees of a member institution shall solicit high school athletes. This would not strictly apply to the "Big C."

The whole question of rounding up athletic talent in secondary schools has been a frequent cause for controversy in the past few years. Proselyting charges have been common.

PULLMAN, Wash., May 30.—(AP)—More than 100 of the northwest's finest college athletes today awaited the crack of the starter's gun to start the annual northern division conference track and field championships. Six universities and colleges, the universities of Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho, and Washington State and Oregon State colleges, were entered. Washington State, the defending champion, by virtue of comparative scores in dual meets this season, was given the edge to repeat today.

Fair weather and a fast track were promised by the weather man, making conditions ideal for the best possible performances, and numerous broken records were expected. A sprint duel between Capt. Paul Starr, of the University of Oregon, and Paul Swift, Washington State, was a promised feature.

Veteran Turfman Passes Suddenly. CHICAGO, May 30.—(AP)—John Schank, veteran turfman and president of the Chicago Business Men's Racing association which operates Hawthorne track here, died today of a heart attack. He was 66 years old.

CARDS AND CUBS, A'S AND YANKEES TAKE LIMELIGHT

By HERBERT W. BARKER. Associated Press Sports Writer. The St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs of the National League and the Philadelphia Athletics and New York Yankees of the American League emerged from the season's second inter-sectional series with a lion's share of the honors.

Baseball statisticians taking advantage of a complete blank in the major league schedule yesterday, poured over the records of this latest renewal of east-west competition only to discover they simply confirmed anew previous indications that the western clubs of the National League and the eastern outfits of the American League pack the most power.

The actual count in the National League showed 31 victories for the defending western clubs against 19 defeats. In the American League the east chalked up 29 triumphs against 17 for the invading westerners.

The fast-traveling Cardinals, winning nine games out of 10 from the east, moved up from fourth place to second while the Cubs, finally clicking themselves from seventh position to a tie with Cincinnati for fourth with an identical record of nine triumphs and only four defeats. The Pittsburgh Pirates, tied for the lead with the New York Giants at the start of their home stand, won seven games and lost four to the east to regain sole possession of the lead, a game and a half ahead of the Cardinals. The Cincinnati Reds, only western club which failed to hold its own, dropped seven games out of 13 and fell from third place to a tie for fourth.

White, Johnson Battle Should Prove Thriller. With Herb White and "Butch" Johnson tied up against each other in the main event, and Spider Pieper and Frankie Nelson fighting the semifinal, Medford fight fans are assured of a full evening at the Medford armory tomorrow night, according to Mack Lillard, promoter.

Johnson is from Klamath, and gets the name of "Butch" from the way he butchers up his opponents. He is throwing his hat into the lightweight tournament, and declared yesterday that he figured Herb would be easy picking. Medford fans, however, and Herb himself, have different ideas on the subject.

Frankie Nelson is an unknown fighter here, but comes from one of the leading stables in Portland where he has been growing up under the training and experience of fighting such men as Ah Wing Lee, Portland flash.

Lane Polin of Klamath Falls will meet Ray Mann of Central Point in one of the openers, and Chief Grey Eagle, Indian fighter of Chiloquin, will meet Del Jones of La Grande in the other opener. Jones has not been seen in action here either.
