

FAMILY OF CABIN PILFERERS ADMIT WHOLESAL CRIME

Emmett L. Hyde, 52, resident of the Ward Creek district, and two oldest sons, James, 26, and Joseph, 19, will appear in circuit court Friday or Saturday morning to enter pleas of guilty to charges of concealing stolen property, and larceny not in a dwelling.

The three younger sons—Frank, 16; Phillip, 16, and William, 14, are scheduled to appear in juvenile court on the same dates to answer to larceny.

The family settled, according to state police, have admitted and signed statements confessing to wholesale cabin robberies along Rogue river the past two months.

Seven guns were found in the possession of the family—four in the house, and three hidden in the brush.

The cabins were pilfered of miscellaneous furnishings and articles and later traded in exchange for guns, for which the officials say the family had a "stash."

Eight cabins were entered by the accused, according to their admissions.

The father and sons were arrested Tuesday night by the state police and sheriff's office.

GRAND JURY DATE AWAITS SETTING

No date has been set by the circuit judge for the next session of the grand jury. An order continuing the present grand jury, of which Theodore N. Bell, Jr., of Talent is foreman, has been filed.

Among the matters scheduled to come before the grand jury, when it does convene, is the case of Fred Wolf, north end of the county resident, charged in an information with first degree murder for the alleged slaying on May 6 last of William Sheldon as the climax of a triangular affair involving the wife of Wolf.

Attorney Frank DeSours of this city has been retained as counsel for Wolf.

Wolf, a quiet type of man, is held in the county jail where he spends his time reading and working jigsaw puzzles.

A number of routine matters involving the usual run of crime are also awaiting action by the grand jury.

TWO CANDIDATES FOR BOARD DIRECTORS OF NON-HIGH DISTRICTS

Two candidates, to date, have been filed with the county school superintendent's office, for the board of directors for the handling of tuition matters and funds in non-high school areas. The election will be held Monday, June 19 and the final day for filing of nominations is Monday, June 19—the same date for the election of regular school district directors.

The county is divided into five zones.

Mrs. Ruth W. Sparrow is the candidate for zone 1, which embraces the northwest section of the county, from Central Point, and includes all districts wherein there is no high school.

For zone 2, which embraces the northeast section of the county, W. H. Merriman has been nominated.

The other two zones have not yet filed nominations.

All petitions must contain the name of thirty voters and property owners. Edwin Taylor is considered as the nominee for zone 3, which embraces the southwest section of the county.

The directors will levy and administer the high school tuition fund, which has heretofore been done by the county court and the school superintendent.

The zone directors have no power to levy a new tax, do not interfere with the regular school board, and are no part or parcel of a county unit. The board has administrative powers over the tuition fund for the purpose of efficiency, and simplification.

Rules for Exhibitors in Flower Show Announced

The following rules have been announced for 1933 Garden show to be held June 7 and 8 in the high school auditorium.

The classification list and rules submitted to all flower fanciers, follows:

All entries must be in by 11 a. m. doors to be closed at that time, June 7.

There will be only one judging of exhibits and that on the first day of the show.

All furniture and accessories competing in class X must be placed preceding day.

All flowers shown by amateurs must be grown by exhibitor unless otherwise stated.

Exhibitors may not disturb or remove exhibit without permission of committee.

In classes covering artistic arrangements, exhibitors will furnish their own containers and arrange their own exhibits.

Exhibitors must state to what class each entry belongs, but the committee has full power to change incorrect classification.

Unless otherwise stated, all exhibits must be by amateur growers. By the term "amateur" is understood a person who maintains a garden with a view to his own use and enjoyment and not for gain or profit.

All roses exhibited in competition must be from plants which have been grown by and have been the exclusive property of the exhibitor for at least two months immediately preceding the exhibition.

Two or more persons may not exhibit from the same premises. This does not apply to children's displays, under class IX.

Where a certain number of roses, iris, or peonies is designated, there must be neither more or less than that number entered.

- Ribbons on baskets disqualify exhibits.
- All roses should be correctly named as otherwise the exhibit may be disqualified, at the discretion of the judges.
- Exhibits cannot be removed before 8:30 a. m. June 2nd. Flowers to be returned to exhibitor when desired, otherwise they will be distributed to those calling for them at that time.
- CLASS I—ROSES**
Grand Sweepstakes
The Best Rose in the Show
No special entry required. This rose may be selected from any exhibit regularly entered in the show. The contesting and winning rose will be selected by the board of judges, and staged by them.
- Division I.**
Best one rose, any named variety or color, individually exhibited.
- Division II.**
Best three Hybrid Tea or Perpetuals Roses, any one named variety.
- Division III.**
Single, Semi-Double and Miniature Roses
a—Best one bloom of a named single rose.
- b—Best three blooms of a single rose, one named variety.
- c—Best six blooms of a single rose, one named variety. (Single roses are those with but one row of petals; example: Irish Elegance, Irish Fireflame, Isabel, etc.)
- d—Best one bloom of a named semi-double rose.
- e—Best three blooms of a semi-double rose, one named variety.
- f—Best six blooms of a semi-double rose, one named variety. (Semi-double roses are those with more than one row of petals and less than 20 petals. Example: K. of K. Lulu, Red Letter Day, Old Gold, Hawmark Crimson, etc.)
- g—Best display of 12 sprays of miniature roses, either bush or climbing, such as Cecil Brunner, Rita Sammons, Shower of Gold, Jeane, etc.
- Division IV.**
a—Best bowl or vase of not less than 12 nor more than 35 roses of any one variety, or mixed as to color and variety.
- b—Best basket of not less than 12 nor more than 35 roses of any one variety, or mixed as to color and variety.
- Division V.**
Climbing Roses
a—One spray of a named variety.
- b—Best three sprays of roses of any named variety.
- c—Best basket or bowl of climbing rambler or brier roses, one named variety or mixed colors and varieties.

- CLASS VI.**
Iris
Division I.
Rhinoceros. To be displayed in container provided by exhibitor.
a—Single spike of named variety.
b—Three spikes of one named variety.
- Division II.**
Bulbous.
a—Single spike of named variety.
b—Three spikes of one named variety.
- Division III.**
Other Varieties
a—Single spike of named variety.
b—Arrangement of three or more spikes of one variety or mixed varieties.
- CLASS VII.**
Peonies.
To be exhibited in container provided by exhibitor.
a—One peony any named variety or color individually exhibited.
b—Best three peonies, any named variety.
c—Best collection of peonies, any color or variety.
- CLASS VIII.**
Tall Garden Flowers
a—Best exhibit of delphinium.
b—Best exhibit of columbine.
c—Best exhibit of tall garden flowers other than above.

- CLASS V.**
Medium-Stemmed Flowers
Best exhibit of medium-stemmed garden flowers, as Sweet William, Geum Pyrethrus, Iceland Poppy, Pink, Lupin, etc. either one kind or mixed varieties.
- CLASS VI.**
Short-Stemmed Garden Flowers
a—Pansies.
b—Violas.
c—Sweet peas.
d—Best exhibit of short-stemmed flowers other than above. (This may include Rock Garden plants).
- CLASS VII.**
Flowering Shrubs, Trees and Vines.
a—Specimen branches of flowering trees.
b—Specimen branches of flowering shrubs.
c—Vines.
- CLASS VIII.**
Arrangements.
This class may include any flowering foliage or vines separately or in combination with flowers.
a—In silver or pewter.
b—Brass or copper.
c—Pottery.
d—Glass.
e—Baskets.
f—Kitchen ware.
Note—(Exhibitor to provide container.)
- CLASS IX.**
Children's Displays
a—Miniature gardens. To be shown flats, the outside dimensions of which must not exceed 36x24x4 inches.
b—Arrangements of flowers by child

- under 14 years of age in any container.
- CLASS X.**
a—Breakfast table for two using card tables which is to be furnished by exhibitor.
b—Occasional table with flowers arrangement and accessories as desired. Other furniture permissible. This may include living room, hall, bed-side, tea, porch, or terrace table.
- Educational
Forestry exhibit.
Wild flower exhibit.
