NORMAL BULLETIN HAS INFORMATION SUMMER SESSION

ASHLAND, Ore., June 2.—(Sp.)—The complete summer bulletin describing the courses offered in the Southern Oregon Normal school during the two terms of the summer session, was printed this week and is now available upon request.

A total of sixty-eight courses are scheduled in the fields of art, economics, education, English, geography, health education, history, library instruction, music, physical education, psychology, laboratory science and sociology.

The first six weeks' session will be held at Ashland from June 19 to July 28, and the second five weeks from July 31 to September 1. Enrollment may be made in either or both terms. It is announced. During the full period of 11 weeks a term's work may be completed, and recent high school graduates, as well as more advanced students, may utilize the summer offerings to count as a regular quarter.

Preliminary inquiries indicate there will be a good attendance at Ashland, as well as at the other summer sessions of the state system of high education at Corvallis, Eugene, La Grande, Monmouth and Portland.

President Walter Redford will be director of the Ashland session and most of the regular members of the faculty will remain to teach during the summer.
