

RECEIVE FLOWERS FOR GARDEN SHOW WEDNESDAY MORN

Flowers will be received for display in the Medford Garden Show next Wednesday morning from 8:30 to 11 o'clock and all growers planning to exhibit are urged to get their flowers arranged before that time as judging will start soon after arrival of the noon hour.

No displays will be accepted after 11 o'clock, so those which have not arrived before that time will not appear in the show. The increased size of the annual event has made it necessary for the committees to be more strict in enforcement of rules governing entries.

The show will open to the public at 3:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and will remain open through Thursday.

Exhibitors are reminded that all flowers must remain in displays until Friday morning, June 9, when committees will be in the high school auditorium to remove the flowers, containers and all arrangements connected with the show.

Among this year's most anticipated displays will be those from the local Japanese colony. Many lovely flowers and arrangements were entered by the Japanese women last year and since the last show, it is understood they have been thinking in terms of flowers and flower arrangements. Many Garden club members stole some time from show plans today to participate in the making of corsages for the Medford high school graduates, who will wear them at commencement tonight.

POLLUTION CURE FOR WILLAMETTE AIM AT MEETING

PORTLAND, June 2.—(AP)—Forthright action on a definite program to cleanse the Willamette river of pollution sewage, was urged by Governor Julius L. Meier at a meeting here Thursday attended by mayors or other representatives of nearly all cities and towns in the Willamette basin. It is planned to use federal money if this is available through the public works bill now before congress, in the construction of sewage disposal plants.

A committee of three engineers will immediately undertake a survey to determine what is needed. Each city was urged to cooperate to the utmost with this committee. The governor said "there will be no delay; we will have this presented at Washington, D. C., at the earliest possible moment."

At least \$10,000,000, it was said, could be invested now in sewage disposal plants on the Willamette river, diverting refuse and industrial waste from the stream. Governor Meier said such a system of disposal plants "will not only be beneficial to the public health, protect fish life and clear up a general nuisance, but will aid materially in relieving our unemployment problem."

BOY CHARGED WITH STEALING SHOTGUNS

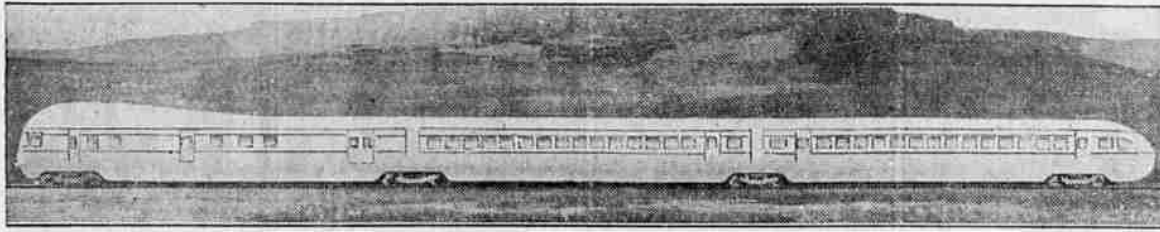

COUNTY COURT TO EUGENE CONCLAVE ON O-C REVENUE

Members of the county court, the county assessor, and county treasurer left this morning early for Eugene, where they will attend a conference of officials of western Oregon counties, to discuss the Oregon-California land grant and decide if they will institute legal proceedings for the federal money due them in lieu of taxes on government owned land. Counties represented at the meet-

ing, scheduled to start this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock are Tillamook, Coos, Benton, Clackamas, Douglas, Klamath, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Polk, Washington, Yamhill, Lane, Columbia, and Multnomah. The administration recently announced that in accordance with its economy policy, the O-C funds, this year would not be paid in full, but would be pro-rated. Many of the counties planned on the federal money to pay their state taxes, and included it in their budgets for county items. Jackson county recently submitted its 1932 claim for the O-C fund amounting to approximately \$50,000. The federal appropriation for public health service was recently cut from \$300,000 to \$25,000, by the economy action, leaving practically nothing to carry on the work. The cut becomes effective July 1.

The Eugene conference of officials will also discuss this situation. Elimination of the fund is a severe blow to health work among children and adults, who otherwise would not be able to procure medical benefits. County Judge E. H. Fehl, County Commissioners R. E. Keelson, and Ralph S. Billings, County Treasurer A. C. Walker, and County Assessor J. B. Coleman made the trip.

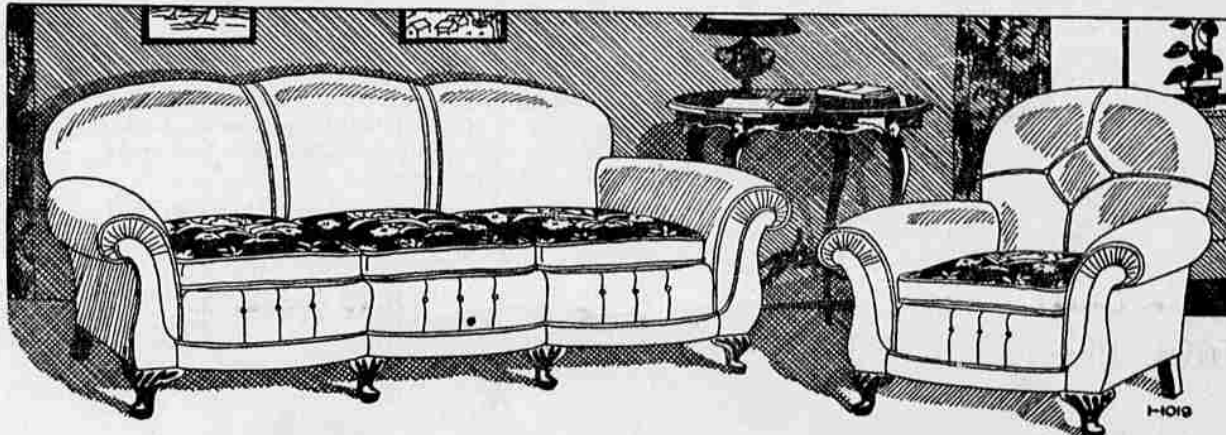

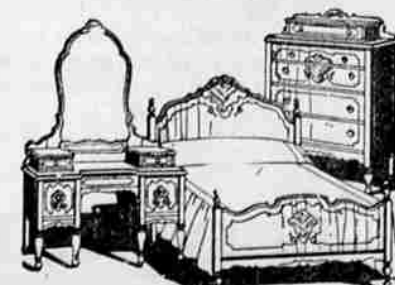
