

ANNUAL MAIL TRIBUNE TRAP SHOOT SUNDAY JUNE 11

COVETED TROPHY AGAIN POSTED FOR SCATTER GUNNERS

Cups and Cash Prizes for Amateurs and Professionals in Added Events—Many Shooters Will Come

Preparations are nearing completion for the fourth annual Medford Mail Tribune trapshooting tournament to be held at the Medford Gun club grounds Sunday, June 11, starting at 10:30 o'clock.

Special trophies will be offered for amateurs and professionals and cash prizes of \$100. The Mail Tribune trophy will be shot for in events one, two, three and four. The trophy was first placed in competition in 1930 and is shot for each year over the Medford Gun club traps at 100 16-yard targets.

Any amateur trapshooter is eligible to compete for this fine trophy and anyone winning it three times becomes its permanent owner. The holder must agree to return it to the Mail Tribune or the Medford Gun club 30 days prior to the date of its being placed in competition.

Cash Prizes Also

A year's subscription to the Mail Tribune also goes to the winner of the trophy. Winners to date are: E. H. Lampert, B. L. Hardenbrook and W. W. Hale.

There will be four 25-target events at the shoot with \$50 in cash to high guns on the 100 targets. In the 50-target handicap there will be two 25-target events with \$25 in cash to high guns.

A cumulative purse, perpetuated by Chester W. Wood, will be shot for in the 50-target handicap event. A first time winner will receive \$10 in cash, and a second time winner will receive \$15. First time winners are Wm. Heckman of Modoc Point and E. W. Pease of Medford.

In the 15-pair doubles there will be one event with \$7.50 in cash to high guns.

Special Trophies Up

Among the special trophies is listed the Pacific International Trap shooting trophy to the high gun on combined scores made on 100 16-yard and the 50-handicap targets shot at on this program.

The same association also offers a medal to all shooters making a long run of 100 or more and a diamond-set trophy to any shooter breaking 200 straight.

The Medford Gun club will award a fine trophy to the professional shooter making the highest score on 150 targets, including 100 16-yard and 50 handicap.

Shooters are expected for the events from Klamath Falls, Bend, Marshfield, Empire, Coquille and Rogue Valley towns. Elaborate plans are being made to care for the guests. The grounds at the local club are in fine condition and trees will offer adequate shade. The Medford club is known as one of the most attractive shooting grounds in the northwest. Luncheon will be served on the grounds during the noon hour.

Game at Fairground Called for 2:30 With Ceremonies Eagle Point Going to Coquille for Opening Tilt

Sunday, June 4, will mark the opening of the Southern Oregon baseball league, with manager Haight of Jackson county holding the spotlight of Medford county interest by tangling with Red Ruppert's Roseburg Vets at the fair grounds.

Paul Hoffer will take his Eagle Point Cheshamers to Coquille for the opener, while Ashland Lithians will journey to Klamath Falls to cross bats with the Klamath Pelicans on Modoc field.

Ceremonies to Open.
 The game at Medford, which will see ceremonies appropriate for opening day, is expected to draw the largest crowd in recent years. Medford will have either Pritchett or Lake in the box with probably George Harrington catching. The game is called at 2:30.

At Coquille Loomis will hurl for Eagle Point with Ivan Harrington relieving, while Bill Fortier, Coquille manager, will start Gilbert in the box with Fischer catching.

Batteries for the opening game at Klamath Falls will be for Ashland, McFadden to Balovich and for the Pelicans, Lefty Monitore to Prisco Edwards.

Interest Red Hot.
 Late reports from all league towns is to the effect that interest in the opening games is red hot.

The Ashland Lithians, expected to be homeless, due to a city ordinance banning Sunday baseball in the city limits, have made arrangements to use the city airport for their home games. It is located about a mile and a half south of Ashland, the use of which will cancel the necessity of the Lithians playing their home games at the fair grounds.

DEMPSEY DENIES TRYING DOUBLE CROSS HERR MAX

NEW YORK, June 2.—(UP)—Jack Dempsey today heatedly denied charges that he is trying to engineer Max Schmeling's defeat in the Maxie Baer bout at Yankee stadium, June 8.

Dempsey was angered by a telegram from Schmeling's manager, Joe Jacobs, who accused Dempsey of failing to show the proper impartiality for a promoter. He openly charged the Manassa Mauler with being too much interested in Baer and trying to bring about Schmeling's downfall.

Jacobs resented Dempsey's coaching the California boxer at Atlantic City Monday, after Dempsey had analyzed the styles of both fighters by boxing one round each with them on Saturday and Sunday.

"Jacobs is putting me in a bad light," Dempsey said, "and he's trying to break up my friendship with Schmeling. He accuses me of coaching Baer to get his man licked. I knew Schmeling before Jacobs ever met him, and he is one of my warmest friends.

"When Jacobs charges that I'm rooting for Baer to win, he is making an out and out mistatement. I might make that stronger. He's the last fellow in the world to be accusing me of trying to double-cross anybody."

BELCASTRO AND ANDERSON GRACE GRAPPLING CARD

Suitable opponents for Pete Belcastro and Swede Anderson, who are to appear on next Wednesday's wrestling card at the Medford armory, are to be announced soon by Promoter Mack Lillard. The promoter has several wires out for rough and tough grapplers who may be depended upon to give the belligerent Sacramento Italian a violent evening.

Belcastro has proved a great favorite here, due to his utter disregard for such rules as are generally supposed to govern the heave and hug game, going in to win as speedily as possible.

Anderson, a newly risen contender in muscle mangle circles, gave a good account of himself in his recent tussle with Belcastro, using enough of his old football days tactics to knock Belcastro clear into the four-bit seats to take the second fall. Belcastro, however, lit on his head and was able to come back for the third fall and threw Anderson after giving him four airplane spins and a series of rabbit punches. Fans voiced disapproval of Les Weiss' decision on calling Anderson down, as they declared his shoulders weren't on the mat. The fall was counted, however, and Anderson is out after another bout. If he wins next Wednesday, and continues to win, he may get another chance at Belcastro, and Medford fans feel that with added experience, together with Anderson's superior strength, he can count Belcastro among his victims.

By putting both Anderson and Belcastro on the same card, to meet different opponents, Promoter Lillard feels that he is giving Medford fans the best wrestling card within reach of Medford. Plenty of action, plenty of rough stuff, and plenty of straight wrestling is assured to round out a full evening, and Anderson's sudden rise in wrestling circles will either continue, or be set back.

Announcement of opponents for the two matlers is expected this evening or tomorrow.

LOCAL PRO WILL SEEK NORTHWEST OPEN GOLF TITLE

With the avowed ambition of repeating his performance of 1925 when he defeated Neil Christian for the Northwest open golf crown, Jack Hueston, Rogue Valley Golf club pro, leaves Sunday to enter the tourney which this year will be held on the Pir Crest Country club links in Tacoma, starting Thursday, June 8, with 36 holes to be played on that day and the low 64 and ties to resume hostilities Friday.

Christian, present pro at the Warrenton club in Portland, was Northwest open title holder in 1924 and was defeated by Hueston in Tacoma, the latter losing the crown in 1926 at Spokane. Christian is again the champ and Hueston's friends and backers are confident history will repeat itself.

Hueston has been burning up the local course of late, carding 68, 69 and low 70's with regularity. He has had considerable tournament experience, having been close to titles in state championships and runner-up in the Montana open at the Butte country club in 1920.

Hueston, who has served as pro at the Rogue Valley course over four years, was the discoverer of Von Elm's possibilities as a tournament player, taking him as a young and green golfer to the Vancouver tourney in 1920 where Von Elm won to the quarter finals. The youngster returned in 1921 and 1922 to win the title.

In 1925 when Hueston was hailed as the Northwest open champion he was pro at the Eastington Golf club of Seattle, the second oldest club in the northwest.

Members of the Rogue Valley club will watch their professional's progress at Tacoma with keen interest next week and hopes are high that he will succeed in bringing back one of the coast's major golf honors.

The Missionals pounded Joe Noonan, former St. Mary's athlete, for 13 hits to even the series and climb back into fourth place.
