Comment on the Day's News

THE annual convention of the American Legion is an important event in Oregon, attended by thousands of people and drawing large space in the newspapers.

It is expected in Klamath Falls that the attendance this year will be somewhere around 3,000. This is a low estimate, taking into consideration the condition of the times, which may restrict people's inclination to travel this year, and the location of Klamath Falls at the extreme southern border of the state.

It is the first convention of the American Legion ever held in Oregon where the business men were not asked to underwrite the cost. The Legion post at Klamath Falls is financing it wholly without assistance.

That came about in this way: For many years, the right of Klamath Falls to the state convention of the American Legion has been conceded, but as long as the beautiful Legion Memorial building there remained unpaid for the local post did not put in its bids for the state convention.

AT THE state convention at Portland last year, nobody wanted the 1933 session. It meant a lot of money, and everybody feared that a lot of money couldn't be raised in 1933.

So Klamath Falls stepped into the breach, and ACCEPTED the responsibility. The Klamath Legionnaires see in the convention an opportunity to bring to the attention of the rest of Oregon the marvelous scenic beauties of the whole Southern Oregon country.

EVERYBODY everywhere is taking to go and to remain as long as he wants to stay. Visitors will be shown the great Klamath country in such a way that they will never forget it.

IN every way possible, the resources of the Klamath country are to be stressed during the convention. The badges, for example, will be made of thin strips of pine wood, with a pine tree printed on the badge.

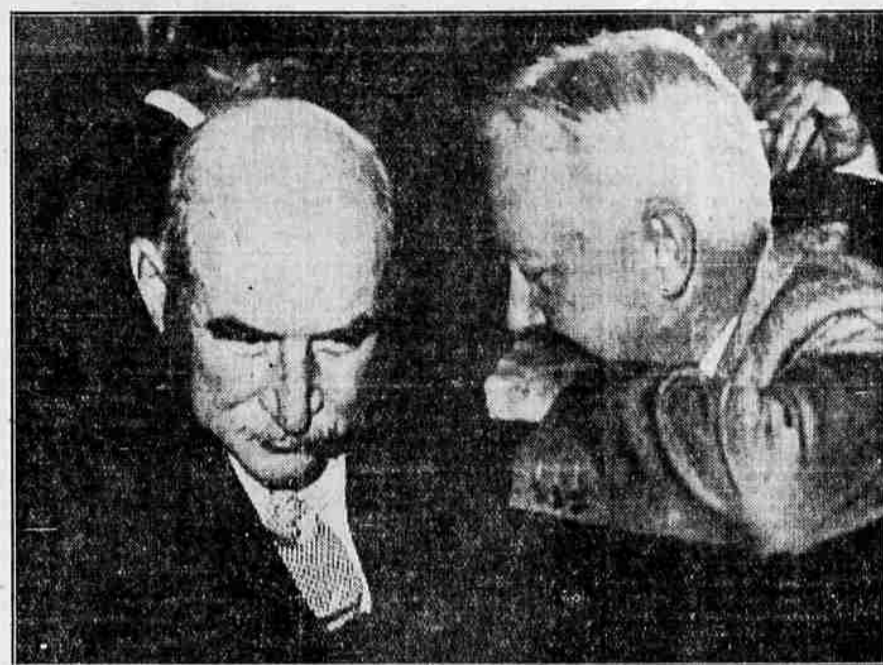

The state of Oregon expects to have one of the Jackson county boys who were arrested last week, and to prosecute the remaining cases as fast as conditions will permit. 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UPSTATE AID TO RETAIN BEAUTY OF CRATER ROAD

Preservation of Wooded Tract Near Prospect Rests With Forest Service—State Park Board Urges Exchange of Timber.
