MEDFORD ROGUES TO PLAY ROSEBURG IN FIRST CLASH

Valley Fans Interested in Game—Bill Lake to Pitch—Opening Ceremonies and Prizes.

Today is the day. Medford meets Roseburg in the opening baseball game of the Southern Oregon baseball league at the fairgrounds starting at 2:30. While Medford and Roseburg play here, Ashland will cross bats with Klamath Falls at the latter city, while Eagle Point journeys to Coquille to combat with the Lumberjacks.

Fans Interested

Considerable interest has been created among the fans throughout the circuit mainly due to the fact that the league is composed of six strong, well balanced teams. Each team will play each other twice on a home diamond, which makes a total of ten games on each team's schedule.

Manager Height has gathered together a strong aggregation of semi-pro and college stars. In pre-season practice games the Rogues looked mighty good, two weeks ago Eagle Point was defeated 3 to 1 while Tuesday, Memorial day, Jacksonville was swamped 21 to 2 in a one-sided contest. Regular practice seasons have been held and the team as a whole is in good shape.

Pitcher Pritchett will be unable to take the mound today, due to the fact that he must attend a managers meeting of all Western Auto managers of Oregon at Roseburg while Bernie Hughes, star outfielder, will be unable to leave his work at Crater Lake. Both will be badly missed by Manager Height.

Lake to Start

The starting lineup will find Pitcher Bill Lake on the mound. Lake has a fast ball and a fast breaking curve and in Height's opinion will be picked up by some coast league club before the season is over. He is but 20 years of age and weighs 180 lbs. Last year Lake starred on the U. of O. freshman team and later with the Eugene town team of the state league. Coy of Gold Hill will be behind the plate. The balance of the lineup will be as follows: Del Anderson, 1st base; Luke Lang, 2nd base; Mgr. Hal Height, shortstop; Tooley Williams, 3rd base; Geo. Harrington, left field; Chuck Clay, center field and Jack Forette of Robby Robinson in right field. Jack Caldwell will be held in reserve for mound duty. Jack pitched a nice game in his first start with the Rogues against Jacksonville.

Bolger to Pitch First Ball

Ceremonies preceding the game will find W. S. Bolger pitching the first ball, with Joe Flegel as his battery mate. Mayor E. M. Wilson will be out with his big bat to try and knock the ball out of the park provided Bolger can get it over the pan. Flegel promises to throw out any one trying to steal a base. With this group a total of 110 have filed for vote on July 21. Fourteen of these favor retention. A total of 116 delegates will be elected.

College Sports

PULLMAN, Wash., June 3.—(AP)—Two of four marks set at the northern division conference track and field meet here last Saturday were accepted as records by the records committee here today.

Warren Demaris' javelin throw of 303 feet 2 inches was allowed as a new conference record, along with the shot put mark of 49 feet 7 3/4 inches set by Hal Dunker, Washington State college. Demaris is a sophomore at the University of Oregon.

Because of a brisk wind the marks of Paul Starr, Oregon sprinter, and Dan Bracken, University of Washington hurdler, were not accepted. Starr ran the 200-yard dash in 21 seconds flat, six tenths of a second better than the record set by Wesley Foster, Washington State, in 1928. Bracken ran the 220-yard low hurdles in 33.2 seconds, equalling the conference record set by Steve Anderson University of Washington, in 1922.

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 3.—(AP)—The University of Oregon defeated Oregon State college 3 to 2, here today in the final game of a six-game series. The schools split the series with three games each.

The Webfoots took a two-run lead in the second inning, but the Beavers tied the score in the fourth. The teams fought scoreless until the first half of the tenth inning, when Garbarino scored for Oregon on a long fly after Rasmussen's bobble of an infield grounder. The Staters got a man on in their half of the extra inning, but he died on third.
