

Medford Rogues Win 10 to 7 Over Roseburg in League Inaugural

LAKE SHINES AT BAT AND HURLS SUPERIOR BALL

Good Crowd Sees Close and Exciting Game As New League Gets Under Way — Ceremonies Open Tilt

Medford's Rogues defeated the Roseburg Vets 10 to 7 Sunday at the fairgrounds in the opening game of the league season. It was a fast and exciting battle with the score tied up twice, and full of hitting and fast fielding. A crowd of 300 saw the encounter and got their money's worth.

Lake, pitching for the Rogues, got three hits, drove in six runs, scored three times himself, and was the individual star for the locals. Sanders, left field for Roseburg, snared a half dozen long flies, that would have been extra base clubs with ordinary fielders.

Roseburg Scores Early
Roseburg started with a rush, and scored three runs in the first inning. The Rogues finally bunched hits in the fourth to tie the score, and took a two run lead. The visitors however, came right back, and evened things up again.

The Rogues in the closing time at bat, put across three runs to put the game on ice.
Roughness of the field hampered good fielding and allowed several balls which should have been easily fielded to go for hits.

George Harrington caught a bang-up game for Medford. Shortstop Haight, who is manager of the locals, flashed a classy bit of fielding when he caught a sleeping Roseburg runner at second.

The game was opened with William Bolger pitching, Joseph Feigel catching and Mayor Wilson batting. They were awkward, but willing. Court Hill umpired in a dignified manner. The crowd laughed and cheered.

RUHL RETAINS CUP AS DUB CHAMPION OF LOCAL COURSE

Surprising everyone including himself R. W. Ruhl, champion "dub" of the Medford Golf club, retained his title and the tin-can trophy presented by a local firm of plumbers, when he defeated F. H. Reum in the 35-hole final match one up, yesterday morning.

On the first 18 holes Saturday, Reum clicked along steadily with an even 100, while Ruhl shot 107, putting the former four up, and 18 more to go.

As hooping under 100, according to the rules of this tournament, costs the shooter \$3, the Moosejaw Scotchman, about the same score on Sunday—the best score that can be made free of charge, Ruhl threw discretion to the winds, let out the reefs in his canvas pants, donned his furl-lined mittens, opened his purse strings and shot a 93. On the first nine he shot a 45, which evened the contest and the second nine a 48, which proved to be a terrific struggle.

This is the second time the niblick editor has won the dub title, and intimate friends (particularly his banker) are urging him to retire, from the dub lists and enter the amateur national in September. Ruhl, however, who has his picture taken by Shantz in a fighting pose yesterday, questions his own amateur status. He not only had to pay \$2 to win yesterday, but \$2 during the tournament to beat Walter Leverage and now the dub committee has sent him a bill for \$7.50, for incidentals.

Urged for public statement, an article and "tips on tee shots" for the U. S. Golf Magazine, Ruhl when contacted today said he had not made up his mind. "I shall either retire or turn pro," was all he would say.

"His defeated opponent, 'Moosejaw' was more communicative.

"Look over the scores," said he "and figure out who is the better golfer. I shot two 100's—a total of 200—had a good time and it didn't cost me a cent. My opponent shot 107 and a 18 also a total of 200 (the same score) and it cost him \$2, a cup of coffee and two packages of Camels."
