You inquire on the inside that Senator McAdoo made a speech which raised the hair on some Republican heads. Among other things he is supposed to have remarked that he personally knew some things against Judge Louderback which were not brought out in the prosecution. He spoke strongly against the San Francisco judge.

His speech had an effect opposite to what he intended. Several Republican senators were on the fence at the time, not knowing how they were acting as a jury to consider only the evidence.

After hearing McAdoo, they decided to vote for Louderback. They probably would have anyway.

The senate crowd has been holding Mr. Roosevelt back on his tariff measures.

Whenever he and his state department advisers agree on something the senators run down and whisper that it goes too far. They want to whittle it down so they will have no trouble getting it through congress.

That would be a vague subterfuge. Everyone knows which way he is going to move the tariffs. He has announced it enough.

The Tammany ship is sinking. That old bark has weathered many a political gale but it was never in such distress as now.

When the announcement of Congressman Loring Black as a candidate for mayor of New York City, Black has taken orders from Boss McCooey of Brooklyn for many years. He is not so stupid as to think he can lick the organization single-handed. He does pride himself on being a political weather prophet. He has never been known to stick to a sinking craft any longer than necessary.

His candidacy means that one smart Tammany lieutenant thinks the New York City outfit is headed for the bottom.

Black may never be mayor of New York but you can bet that he will come out of this fight with his own shirt and that of someone else. If the lightning does not strike him, he will trade. He has been very friendly with Jimmy Walker. The time may not yet be near when the ex-mayor will try a comeback. There are unmistakable signs on the inside that Walker will grasp the first opportunity.

The Black candidacy might conceivably afford that opportunity. Stranger things have happened.

GIANT DEMETRAL WILL GIVE BELCASTRO BUSY EVENING

ROUGHHOUSE PAIR FOR MAIN EVENT WEDNESDAY CARD

With Harry Demetral wrestling Pete Belcastro and Herman Olson wrestling Swede Anderson, Medford's fight and wrestling fans are assured two of the liveliest matches in a decade here tomorrow night. Mack Lillard, promoter, was able to secure the matches only after many long distance telephone calls and telegrams, and said yesterday he believed the card would be the best wrestling program here in years.

Demetral has been prominent in Portland, in Washington and in British Columbia, and weighing 230, has been a constant threat in heavy-weight circles for years. His weight is expected to offset Belcastro's speed, roughness and aggressiveness, and provide a wonderful match. Belcastro, it is felt, will have his hands full because Demetral is inclined to play rough also.

Olson has been wrestling on Tom Ray's cards in Longview, and has come to the front in the fashion of champions. In Anderson he meets a man with more strength and power than experience, but whose strength makes him a threat to any wrestler.

"Swede" showed possibilities in his match with Belcastro when he threw the scrappy Italian one fall. With more experience it is felt Anderson will be in line for big game.

Belcastro still thinks he is the best man in the world, and has been wanting a match with Demetral for many months. Flattering offers got Demetral here and his appearance may be the forerunner to even more noted wrestlers, Lillard said.

Anderson and Olson will open the program with plenty happening from then on.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—Successfully applying chin locks, Otis Clingman of Oklahoma City took two falls out of three over Bull Stastny of Seattle to win the main event of last night's wrestling matches here. Clingman weighed 161 pounds and Stastny 142.

Clingman took the first fall in 17 minutes with a series of chin locks. Stastny won the second fall in 7 minutes with a hammerlock. The Oklahoman took the deciding tumble 8 minutes later with another series of chin locks.

BAER AND SCHMELING IN SHAPE FOR TITLE BATTLE

NEW YORK, June 6.—(AP)—Trained to the minute, Max Baer and Max Schmeling can afford to take things easy until they square off for their 15-round heavyweight duel in the Yankee stadium Thursday night, but there was no rest immediately in sight for Promoter Jack Dempsey.

There is no doubt Jack has worked harder the last couple of months in his new role than he ever did when he was getting ready to defend his heavyweight championship a few years ago and the end had not yet come today.

Financially the bout seemed certain of success, but there were a thousand and one details to be ironed out before Dempsey could breathe a sigh of relief and let the show go on.

The major task confronting him was the converting of the stadium

into a fight arena. As soon as the New York Yankees completed their doubleheader with Boston today, Dempsey planned to move in a small army of workmen to set up the ring and arrange the seats. Once that's done to his satisfaction, all he'll need to worry about is the weather.

Tentatively at least Dempsey has been promised fine weather. James H. Scarr, head of the New York weather bureau, says Thursday "probably will be fair."

If it is, indications were a crowd of close to 60,000 would pour into the stadium for the match. Dempsey said yesterday he had \$100,000 cash in hand and another \$50,000 in reservations. The expected last-minute rush for tickets was expected to send the receipts close to \$300,000.

Betting on the bout has been very light with Schmeling a steady 2 to 1 choice.
