

# Baer Stiffest Test in Schmeling's Campaign to Regain Heavy Title

## SCHMELING MEETS TOUGHEST FOE OF CAREER THURSDAY

Chance of Regaining Heavy-weight Crown Depends On Ability to Overcome Youth and Weight of Rival

NEW YORK, June 7.—(AP)—For the first time since he arrived in this country, perhaps for the first time in his career, Max Schmeling is being asked to give away chunks of weight to a young, tough rival, Max Baer, and on his success in solving that problem in the Yankee stadium tomorrow night rests his chance of becoming the first ex-heavyweight champion in history to regain the title.

For if he whips the heavy Californian decisively in Jack Dempsey's first New York promotional venture, few experts doubt his ability to "take" either the aging Jack Sharkey or the mammoth Primo Carnera, who will meet for the title in Madison Square Garden's outdoor bowl in Long Island City June 29.

**Odds on German.**  
Even those ringworms who believe the 215 to 1 odds on Schmeling's favor are justified, agree that in Baer the German will be facing his stiffest test. The 210-pound Livermore, Calif., youngster has made tremendous progress in the last two years and his great strength and stamina, coupled with surprising speed in so big a man, make him a formidable foe for any heavyweight in the business.

The conviction has become general that whatever the outcome of their 15-round tussle, Baer and Schmeling offer a "natural" that will bring close to 60,000 fans into the big ball park. Complete training.

Both fighters have completed training for the match and are waiting for the signal to swing into action. Baer left his Atlantic City camp for a private home in New York today, but Schmeling planned to remain at Lake Swannanoa, N. J., until tomorrow, arriving in New York just before the weighing-in at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

A steady stream of customers filing past the box office windows strengthened Dempsey's expectations of a crowd of 60,000 and receipts of nearly \$500,000 granting favorable weather. The gates will be thrown open at 3 p. m. (E. S. T.) Thursday afternoon.

The first preliminary was scheduled for 7 p. m. (E. S. T.) and the main bout between 8:30 and 9 p. m. There will be no broadcast.

## COLORFUL ITALIAN MEETS DEMETRAL IN MAIN TUSSLE

Followers of the muscle mangers art are promised an evening of thrilling entertainment at the armory tonight when Pete Belcastro, colorful and dynamic Sacramento Italian matches grips with Harry Demetral, well-known heavy-weight grappler who has appeared in many coast rings.

Belcastro, due to his aggressiveness and rough and ready tactics has won a considerable following among Medford fans in his previous appearances against Ray Frisbie and Swede Anderson, local man. In matching Belcastro with Demetral, Promoter Mack Lillard is giving the Italian a high hurdle as Demetral scales 230 pounds and is nothing loath to use unorthodox methods if an opponent chooses to "play" that way.

Swede Anderson, former Medford football star, will make his second appearance here in the role of wrestler when he meets Herman Olson, Seattle, in the curtain-raiser. Anderson gave Belcastro an unhappy evening in their match here some weeks ago, bouncing the Italian completely out of the ring with a well-directed Sonnenberg to take one fall. However, Pete was too experienced for the local man, and succeeded in taking the deciding fall. In tonight's grapple, Anderson meets an opponent more his own caliber, so far as experience is concerned, as the Seattle bone crusher does not boast an extensive record in the ring. He is rated as a fast-moving matman in the Puget Sound country and his battle with the Medford athlete should prove interesting.

The usual low prices will prevail tonight and the starting gong will sound at 8:30 o'clock.

## CHINESE GRAPPLER DEFEATS KAPLAN

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—Taking two straight falls, one of them on a foul, Wong Bock Cheung, Chicago Chinese, won the main event of last night's wrestling matches here from Abe Kaplan of New York. Cheung weighed 214 pounds and Kaplan 219.

The Chinese was given the first fall in 25 minutes when Kaplan dropped him with an uppercut to the jaw and the referee called it a foul. Cheung took the second and deciding fall in 10 minutes with a Manchurian choke hold.

Richard Stahl, 218, Berlin, won the five-round semi-windup from Nore Jerstrom, 215, Chicago, getting one fall. Larry Bennett, 171, Portland, and Heinle Olson, 172, Portland, went three rounds to a draw in the preliminary.

## PROHI LEAGUERS TAKE NO ACTION TO CONTEST LAW

PORTLAND, June 7.—(AP)—No action was taken by the Oregon Anti-Liquor league here in the direction of contesting the constitutionality of the state law providing for a convention to determine upon the repeal or retention of the 18th amendment. Although E. M. Heacock, president, had declared in Eugene last week that such discussion would be undertaken at the Monday meeting in Port-

land, he said here yesterday that it has been decided the test of constitutionality will not be made at the present.

Heacock said the question of constitutionality was not discussed at the meeting of the committee of nine of the United Drys of Multnomah county. He had said the constitutional convention would be attacked on the grounds the law provided for pledged delegates who would have no discretion whatever in casting their ballots either for repeal or retention of the 18th amendment.

On July 21 Oregon voters will elect 116 delegates to this convention, and each voter will be privileged to cast a ballot for or against repeal. The delegates from each county will be obligated to vote in the convention as their county voted in the election. Heacock said his organization and other anti-liquor groups are now centering their attention on the matter of a complete ticket of delegates for the convention.
