MINE ASSESSMENT SUSPENSION ONLY IF NOTICE FILED

Owners of mining claims, who desire to take advantage of the act of congress suspending annual assessment work, must, prior to noon, July 1, 1933, file a notice with the county clerk of the county in which the claims are located, according to act of congress approved May 18, 1933, copy of which was received today by Attorney Frank DeSouza from Congressman Walter M. Pierce.

Only those who were entitled to exemption from payment of federal income tax for the taxable year 1932 are entitled to exemption, the full text of the act for suspension of assessment work being as follows:

"Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, that the provision of section 2324 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, which requires on each mining claim located, and until a patent has been issued therefor, not less than \$100 worth of labor to be performed or improvements aggregating such amount to be made each year, be, and the same is hereby, suspended as to all mining claims in the United States, including Alaska, during the year beginning July 1, 1932, and ending at 12 o'clock meridian, July 1, 1933.

"Provided, that the provisions of this act shall not apply in the case of any claimant not entitled to exemption from the payment of a federal income tax for the taxable year 1932.

"Provided further, that every claimant of any such mining claim, in order to obtain the benefits of this act, shall file, or cause to be filed, in the office where the location notice or certificate is recorded, on or before 12 o'clock meridian, July 1, 1933, a notice of his desire to hold said mining claim under this act, which notice shall state that the

claimant, or claimants, were entitled to exemption from the payment of a federal income tax for the taxable year 1932."
