TENGWALD MADE REPRESENTATIVE VETS AID BOARD

DEATH TAKES ONE LIGHTNIN' CREATOR

HARTFORD, Conn., June 10.—(AP)—Winchell Smith 63, who as one of the creators of "Lightnin'" and "Brewster's Millions" was a leading American playwright, died this afternoon at his home, Mill Streams, Farmington, Conn.

His death came less than a year after that of his wife, Grace Spencer Smith, who worked with the playwright on many of his dramas.

EIGHT KILLED IN CELLULOID PLANT BLAST AND FIRE

NORTH ARLINGTON, N. J., June 10.—(AP)—With the toll of the disaster temporarily fixed at eight dead, 5 missing and at least 75 injured, a preliminary investigation into last night's celluloid plant explosion developed evidence police said, pointing to incendiary and industrial warfare as the cause of the holocaust.

John E. Guidetti, Bergen county prosecutor's detective, announced clues of incendiary had been found in the wrecked plant of the Atlantic Pyroxilin Waste company's plant, and told of being informed of threats of reprisal made against the operator of the plant by business rivals.

Alex Scheinert, the operator of the business, was being held on charges of technical manslaughter.

Guidetti's announcement was followed by orders for the arrest of two Elizabeth, N. J., men as material witnesses of the disaster. The names of the men sought were not disclosed.

Guidetti said he had learned that Scheinert had been warned, recently by business rivals, that a "bitter fight" was in the offing to determine which would stay in business the longest.

TWO CONVICTS IN TOILS AT BORDER

SAN ANGELO, Tex., June 10.—(AP)—Billy Woods and Clifford Dapson, who escaped with nine other convicts from the Kansas penitentiary Memorial day, were captured by U. S. customs officers today while fleeing toward the Mexican border.

The fugitives were taken prisoner near Junction, Tex., 150 miles from the Rio Grande, by Customs Officers J. A. Tilley and W. E. Kilborn.

Two women and a baby were with the convicts, who were driving a car stolen in Missouri.
