President meant in saying he was willing to accept in his own name but could not bind congress.

When the British cabinet met last night, highest sources asserted, they had word from Mr. Roosevelt that "token" payment was acceptable on those terms, but they felt they had to know more definitely just what he meant. Today was spent in straightening out the interpretation which was regarded as fully cleared by late afternoon.

Mr. Roosevelt, on his own part, wanted definite assurance that the ten per cent payment—ten per cent being the basis of the reparations settlement accorded Germany at Lausanne—would not be regarded as the basis of the final debt settlement.

LONDON, June 13—(AP)—British feeling against the American war debt attitude is threatening to deprive the United States of the chairmanship of one of the major world economic conference committees, authoritative American sources said today.

It was disclosed that James M. Cox had been scheduled to head the monetary group, but the attitude of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, chairman of the conference, changed in the light of the debt developments.

Today the Cox appointment was uncertain. The French were hard after the monetary chairmanship.

FRANKFURT, Mich., June 13—(AP)—The coast guard station here reported today that the dirigible Macon, flying in this vicinity, reported by wireless that its rudder had been disabled and it was heading toward Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.

At 2:10 p. m. coast guard officials reported, the Macon sent out another wireless message which they were unable to decipher. Members of the coast guard said the huge dirigible passed over here and disappeared to the north, in the face of a 35-mile headwind.

The dirigible, they said, was near the Lake Michigan shore-line when sighted.

SEATTLE, June 13—(AP)—Confirming an announcement of the civil liberties union in New York, Gov. Clarence D. Martin today said Bert Blended, one of the I. W. W. group sentenced to long prison terms following the Centralia (Wash.) Armistice day riot in 1919, had been paroled from the state penitentiary.

Head, hand and one arm were severed from the body, officers reported.

Dived Under Wheels Grovanitti had thrown himself beneath train No. 7, the Shasta early Monday evening, judging from the position of the body, and the speed at which the train was traveling, Coroner Perl said this noon. It was not definitely established if the Shasta or north bound Oregonian had struck him.

The man spent the greater part of yesterday in Central Point, it was learned, where he talked with Jim Ross, Guy Tex and others there. He was seen to leave the town about 5:30 o'clock and start south along the railroad tracks. Persons who talked to the man, the coroner said, told that Grovanitti had appeared quite worried while there.

It was first thought the man was en route to Larkspur, Marin county, Calif., where either a relative or friend, Ellen Appender resides. He had sent a money order from the Central Point post office yesterday.

Believed Stillborn Coroner Perl said today that funeral services will be held tomorrow for the man. He was said to be about five feet, ten inches tall, weighed about 160 pounds, and was dark complexioned, thought to be the son of the Isle of Sicily. He was wearing a dark gray suit, brown oxfords, a checked gray cap, and silk shirt. He had \$14.24 in his pocket and a box of matches.
