

### REPEAL INITIATIVE GOING ON BALLOT BY COURT DECREE

#### Supreme Court Holds Election Laws Should Be Liberally Construed to Give People Vote Opinion

SALEM, June 13.—(AP)—An initiative measure providing for the repeal of the two dry sections of the state constitution will go on the ballot at the special election in Oregon July 21, the state supreme court decided in an opinion handed down here today. The opinion was written by Justice Bell.

Completed petitions for this measure were filed several weeks ago but were held in abeyance by the secretary of state on the advice of Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle who held that the 1933 legislative act calling for a special election did not include initiative proposals.

George Bylander of Portland later filed mandamus proceedings in the supreme court to compel the secretary of state to place the measure on the ballot. Van Winkle held that while initiative measures were mentioned in the title of the election act no reference was made to them in the body of the law.

"Election laws should be liberally construed to the end that the people may have the opportunity of expressing opinion concerning matters of vital interest in their welfare," the supreme court opinion read. "Expression, not suppression, tends toward good government. The great constitutional principle is that the people have the sovereign right to vote should not be taken away by narrow or technical construction."

"If the statute is of doubtful construction, we think the doubt should be resolved in favor of free expression of opinion."

The court held that it was the intention of the legislature that initiative measures should be included in the election law.

A dissenting opinion was written by Justice Campbell.

In another opinion the court affirmed the Multnomah county circuit court in the cases involving C. A. DeGrace and Carl H. Johnson, officials of the Prudential group of savings and loan associations. De Grace was convicted of fraud and sentenced to a term of five years in the penitentiary and fined \$1000. Johnson was convicted of embezzlement and received a penitentiary sentence of six years.

Johnson served as president of the Prudential group for a number of years.
