MEDFORD PUPILS RECEIVE DEGREES FROM UNIVERSITY

Medford was well represented in the lists of graduates, recipients of higher degrees, and donors to the University of Oregon at the commencement program Monday in Eugene, according to programs and reports of local people returning from the university city.

Among the graduates were: Betty Evanson, Dorothy Goff, Vern Coverstone, Donald Moore, Elaine Demoreest, Mary Hayes, Marian Van Bouyoc, Edna Mohr, Beulah Gore, Robert Hammond, and James L. Gilleland now of Washington, member of one of southern Oregon's pioneer families.

Thelma Perceot of Ashland, well known here, received her doctor of medicine degree; Louis P. Dodge, Ashland merchant, also received a degree.

Robert J. Gould of Medford received his masters degree in French and music; Wendell Van Loan, former member of the local teaching staff, now associated with the university, received his master of science degree in education, and Paul Ager, formerly of this city, received his master's degree in economics and business.

As subject of his thesis, Mr. Gould chose "The Influence of the 18th Century and French Philosophers on the French Opera of that Period." Mr. Van Loan's thesis was devoted to "Orientation of the Unifying Procedure in Guidance," and Mr. Ager's to "Suggested Budgetary Administration and Business Organization with Comparative Budget for Oregon's Unified System of Higher Education, with Budget Report for the Fiscal Year 1932-33."

The name of Edison Marshall, Medford's author, appeared again on the commencement program with announcement of this year's winner of the Edison Marshall story prize, who was Janet Fitch of Eugene.
