

LA DIEU FRIENDS FURNISH BOND AS SENTENCE WAITS

J. Arthur LaDieu, found guilty of ballot theft this week, was yesterday granted liberty on bonds in the sum of \$7500, with Prof. C. Englehardt of the Long Tom Mountain district and Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Dahack of Eagle Point.

Examined as to his qualifications as a bondsman, Prof. Englehardt was obdurate in answering the questions propounded by Deputy District Attorney Nelson and appealed to the court with the query: "Do I have to answer such questions?" The court replied there was no other way to determine his qualifications.

From the questions it developed that Prof. Englehardt's property was assessed at \$3800. He claimed it was worth \$40,000 and had no encumbrances.

The court ruled that the Dahacks could qualify in the sum of \$1500. Mrs. Dahack recently withdrew as a bondsman for J. Croft, one of the alleged ballot stealers. She admitted she had paid no taxes for three years on a service station, though claiming a good business was enjoyed. It was shown that the Dahacks have sufficient property to justify a bond no higher than \$1500.

Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Pinne, original bondsmen for LaDieu, were disqualified to continue in the capacity. They own a home assessed at \$910 and a vacant lot assessed at \$200, with no taxes paid for two years. The state allows them a \$9000 exemption.

LaDieu, through his attorney, filed a motion asking for 30 days in which to file a motion for a new trial.

FORESTRY SCHOOL AT STAR RANGER

APPLIGATE, June 16.—(Sp.)—Annual training school for the forest service workers for the Applegate district was held at the Star ranger station, starting June 5. It was the first of four schools at various points in the county for the forest service. School was to start Thursday at Elk Creek for the workers in that section. The third is to be held at Owen-Oregon camp No. 2 at Butte Falls and the fourth will be at Lake of the Woods for the Klamath and Dead Indian districts.

Ranger L. O. Port and Albert Young of the Star ranger station were instructors. Tuesday, Mr. White took several men to the Tallowbox lookout for instructions and study of the use of the fire finder, scouting, fire detection and reporting. Another group went into the forest to find a fire. Other studies were time keeping, straw boating, elementary compass work, map reading, fire problems, law enforcement, telephone maintenance, public contact, care of small tools and equipment, sanitation and care of quarters. There were 15 local men in attendance. They were Jim Townsend, Jim Wittingham, Leonard Andrews, Hugh Combest, Melvin Rowden, Walter Steveson, John Byrne, Dean Saltmarsh, William McDaniel, Cecil Jelison, Alex Schiehl, Ervin Lewis, Clarence Buck, Lance Affenbacher and Albert Young. Mrs. Heburg prepared the meals for the men.

The forest service put on first lookout for this year June 14, when Dean Saltmarsh and his uncle, Ed Saltmarsh, were moved to Tallowbox.

PINE LUMBERING SHOWS INCREASE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—New business totaling 52,725,000 feet or about 4 per cent above the 3-year weekly average for June, and 9 per cent above the previous week, was reported today by the Western Pine association for the week ending June 10. Only 66 of the 115 reporting mills were operating.

Shipments of 46,985,000 feet and production of 42,558,000 feet put production at 30.6 per cent of capacity as compared with 26.8 per cent the previous week, and 13.5 per cent for the year to date.

Current orders were 38 per cent of sawmill capacity.

MEAT BALLS FOR DINNER
Breakfast
Stewer Prunes, Chilled
Cooked Wheat Cereal Top Milk
Buttered Whole Wheat Toast
Coffee
(Milk for the Children)

Cream of Tomato Soup
Cabbage Salad
Graham Bread Butter
Chocolate Cookies

Meat Balls Creamed Potatoes
Bread Butter
Head Lettuce Salad
Sliced Bananas
(Milk for the Children)
Chocolate Cookies (2 Dozen)
2-3 cup dark brown sugar.
1/2 cup sugar.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
4 tablespoons cocoa.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 cup sour milk.
1 egg.
2 1/2 cups flour.
4 tablespoons fat, melted.
Mix sugar, vanilla, cocoa, salt, milk and egg. Beat two minutes. Add rest of ingredients, mixing lightly. Drop portions from end of spoon onto greased baking sheets. Bake 12 minutes in moderate oven.
Bake cookies in oven when being used for cooking other foods.
Meat Balls
1 pound ground beef.
1 cup crumbs or leftover bread.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
2 tablespoons chopped onions.
2 tablespoons chopped celery.
1 tablespoon, chopped parsley.
1/2 cup milk.
4 tablespoons fat.
Mix meat, bread, seasonings and milk. Shape into 6 cakes. Heat fat in frying pan. Add and brown cakes. Cover, cook slowly 15 minutes. Turn several times to allow even browning.
The cakes can be broiled under the glowing flame of the oven or the meat mixture can be shaped into a loaf and placed in a pan and baked 30 minutes in a moderate oven.

12 slices Graham bread.
4 tablespoons peanut butter.
2 tablespoons soft butter.
2 tablespoons milk.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 cup salad dressing.
Shredded cabbage.
Mix peanut butter, butter, milk and salt. When creamy, spread on bread slices. Place bits of shredded cabbage on half the slices, cover with remaining slices. Press firmly, serve.
Eggs With Tomatoes, Serving 4
4 tablespoons fat.
6 tablespoons flour.
3 cups tomatoes.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
2 tablespoons chopped celery.
4 hard cooked eggs, sliced.
Melt fat and add flour. Mix well, add tomatoes, cook until a creamy mixture forms. Add rest of ingredients, cook 3 minutes. Serve plain or poured over rice.
Cabbage Salad
4 cups shredded cabbage.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
1/2 cup salad dressing.
Chill ingredients. Combine and serve.
Caramel Pudding
1 cup dark brown sugar.
1-3 cup flour.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 egg.
2 1/2 cups milk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1 tablespoon butter.
Blend sugar, flour and salt. Add egg and milk, cook until creamy in double boiler. Stir frequently. Add rest of ingredients. Mix well, serve chilled.

2-3 cup fat.
1 1/2 cups sugar.
1-3 cup vanilla.
1-3 cup milk.
3 cups flour.
1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder.
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.

Cream fat and sugar. Add eggs, vanilla and milk. Add rest of ingredients. Chill dough. Break off bits and bake.
Creamed Codfish
1 cup codfish.
1 cup water.
2 tablespoons butter.
4 tablespoons flour.
2 cups milk.
1 egg.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
Shred the codfish and soak 30 minutes in water. Cook slowly 15 minutes. Melt butter and add flour. Mix and add milk, cook until creamy sauce forms. Add codfish mixture, egg and salt. Cook two minutes.
Gingerbread
2 1/2 cups flour.
1 teaspoon soda.
1 teaspoon baking powder.
2 teaspoons cinnamon.
1 teaspoon ginger.
1 teaspoon cloves.
1/2 cup molasses.
1 egg.
1 cup hot water.
3 tablespoons fat, melted.
Mix ingredients and heat well. Pour into shallow pan, bake 30 minutes in moderate oven.
