Roseburg Journeys to Ashland in League Schedule While Klamath Falls Will Go to Eagle Point

Southern Oregon Baseball league will see its first crucial game next Sunday when Medford travels to Coquille for the game which will decide the undisputed league leadership. At present, the Rogues and the Loggers are tied for the top; each with two wins and no losses to their credit and the battle at the coastal city should be one of the hardest fought of the year.

Pritchett or Lake to Pitch.  
Manager Haight of the Medford team will start either Bill Lake, the hard-hitting pitcher, or Pritchett, the curve ball specialist, in the box. George Harrington will do the receiving. The remainder of the Rogues team will probably be the same as it has been, with Williams, Haight, Lang and Anderson composing the inner defense.

Carl Gilbert, the submarine ball specialist, will probably be on the mound for Coquille with Fred McHale in reserve.

Roseburg at Ashland.  
Ashland, with a greatly strengthened lineup, will be struggling to climb out of the league cellar at the expense of Red Ruppert's Roseburg Yets. Ashland has signed Johnny Butler, the hard hitting third sacker from Talent, for the remainder of the season and he should put the needed punch into the batting order that the Lithians have lacked all year. Jim Conasser will do the hurling with Mike Balovic receiving.

Eagle Pt. Will Try to Climb.  
Another cellar club will be trying to better its standing when Eagle Point tangles with the Klamath Falls Pelicans at Eagle Point. Manager Hoffard will have his Cheesemakers in a dangerous frame of mind. They will be fighting hard to win their initial game of the league schedule and Frisco Edwards and the Pelicans will have their hands full if they wish to retain their title as "the team to beat."

Hoffard is undecided as to whom shall be his pitcher. Ivan Harrington will do the catching regardless. Edwards will have his speed ball southpaw, Lefty Molstore, in the box while Edwards himself will do the work behind the bat.

Baseball Interest Rising.  
Southern Oregon interest in baseball, dead for quite a number of years, is slowly rising to the point where teams can be self-sustaining. Good crowds have been turning out to see the league games and, as the season advances and the race tightens up, they are expected to increase to the old-time size.

## SINKING 'EM

If there is one factor, above most others, that I would like to impress on the general run of golfers, no matter what their handicap rating, it is to CONCENTRATE.

By that I mean concentrate on the right grip and stance, concentrate on choosing the right club and concentrate on choosing the right club concentrate on shooting for the green.

Don't be discouraged or start fiddling around with a different method if you miss one or two shots. It takes practice—and some mistakes—to acquire the right swing and timing. Undisturbed by Gallery.

If you have ever studied the play of a champion closely you will mark the extreme all-around concentration of his play under all sorts of circumstances and with galleries of thousands swarming about him. He would be "lost" quickly if he allowed himself to be distracted from the main goal of his play.

Jones, Outmet and Hagen are great examples of what concentration will do. It is to that factor that I attribute my success last year, especially in the British Open at Prince's. I went to England firmly convinced Prince's was going to be one of the toughest courses I ever tackled; that the only way I could beat it was to concentrate on every angle and every shot. I succeeded so well that I never had a single six on any card over there.

Had Prince's Down "Pat".  
In particular I had studied the No. 8 hole at Prince's, a 480-yarder with two bunkers designed to catch an over-ambitious or erratic tee shot. I discovered the right spot to put my tee shot, where I would get a long uphill but clear shot to the green.

To make sure I drove with a spoon. Twice I got home well enough with the wood to get eagle three. To my success on that hole, more than anything else, I owed my victory.

That will show you how it pays to concentrate, no matter how easy the shot looks. Remember! Mistakes on easy shots are just as costly as those on hard ones, in addition to which they are more likely to produce aggravation and break down the morale.

LEEDS, England (AP)—Miss Poppy Wingate has won the distinction of being the first woman golfer in the British Isles to take part in a leading professional tournament with men.

Augmenting her set of irons with three heavy wooden clubs borrowed from a man, she entered with the country's leading professionals for the Leeds tournament with its stake of some \$3,750.

For eight holes she played well, but a six on the ninth was the beginning of the end and she finished the first qualifying round of 18 holes hopelessly with a 90.

She was back for the second round the following day—but tore up her card in disgust long before finishing the trial.

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## BOSTON RED SOX QUIT CELLAR BY SOCKING YANKEES

The Boston Red Sox, cellar dwellers of the American league almost since time immemorial, have climbed out of their usual position to the dizzy heights of seventh place.

This is nothing new for the rejuvenated Red Sox of 1918—at one time during the second week of the campaign they were as high as seventh place—nor was their rise entirely unexpected. But the way in which they accomplished the feat of leaving the cellar made it appear that they have no intention of returning.

The humble tall-enders picked on the New York Yankees, world's champions and league leaders, as the instrument if their rise and won four straight games. An 8 to 5 triumph yesterday finally lifted them above the idle St. Louis Browns by the slim margin of a half game, which figures out to a single percentage point at the present stage of the race.

The Yankee-Red Sox tilt was the only one played in the junior circuit as Cleveland and Detroit were rained out and the other clubs had an open date.

## STARVING CHINESE BECOME CANNIBALS

SHANGHAI, China, June 16.—(AP)—Terrible suffering and widespread death throughout Shensi province from famine were reported in Chinese press dispatches today.

Once this area in central China was a remarkably fertile wheat growing section, but no rain has fallen in Shensi since 1928, the advices said, and the country has been denuded of "any living vegetation."

Thousands of helpless have died. Others have turned bandit, preying on countrymen not quite so bad off as they. Few farm animals remain. Cannibalism is widespread, the reports continue.

"Wolves are abundant in the famine areas," said the dispatches. "They come every night and obtain victims from among the half-starved people."
