RANSOM PAYMENT NEAR \$100,000 IS ABDUCTORS' PRIZE

Wm. Hamm, Jr., Home Unharmed After Four Days' Captivity — One of Gang Believed Known to Police

ST. PAUL, June 19.—(AP)—William Hamm, Jr., 39, kidnaped millionaire brewer, was released unharmed 45 miles from here today and returned home declaring one of the gang of three or more men who seized him last Thursday resembled Verne Sankey, a fugitive wanted for the kidnaping of Charles Bettcher, II, of Denver, for \$60,000 in February and the seizure of Haskell Bohn, St. Paul, released nearly a year ago on payment of \$12,000.

ST. PAUL, June 19.—(AP)—William Hamm, Jr., kidnaped millionaire brewer, was released today near Wyoming, Minn., and arrived at his home unharmed and in good physical condition. Turned loose 45 miles north of here after four hours as a captive. Hamm came home with Police Chief Thomas E. Dahill and Detective Thomas Brown.

LEAP FROM LIFE

MORE TESTIMONY PAINTS JONES AS BALLOT PLOTTER

County Judge Earl H. Fehl Is Also Further Involved by Witnesses in Trial of Mayor of Rogue River

Further testimony linking Walter J. Jones, mayor of Rogue River, and involving County Judge Earl H. Fehl in the ballot thefts of February 20, last, was introduced by the state this morning in the trial in which Jones is the defendant in circuit court.

SEARCH NEAR SALEM

After having centered earlier in the Umpqua mountain country the search yesterday and today was swung to the rugged territory east of Salem where reports indicated persons near the Black Eagle mines, 11 miles north-east of Mill City, had heard a plane circling overhead about 2 a. m. Saturday.

Many Have Hit Mountain

Malcolm Rasmussen, of Portland, flying one of the searching ships, said the elevation near Mill City is about 1000 feet. "On the line of flight Young was taking," he said, "from all evidence we can gather, he was heading toward Lookout mountain and Table Rock, which are about 5000 feet high. Our informants said he was flying low and it is very probable that he may have struck one of the two mountains."

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19.—(AP)—The search for William Young, Portland flier missing since early Saturday, was renewed today after seven pilots had flown over Young's probable course for several hours Sunday without sighting the missing plane or aviator.
