

# MEDFORD LOSES, 6 TO 1, IN CLASH WITH COQUILLE

### Coast Town Pitcher Holds Haight's Outfit to Two Hits — Pritchett Injures Arm Early in Contest

The Medford Rogues were toppled from first place to a second place tie in the standing of the Southern Oregon baseball league, when downed, 6 to 1, by the Coquille Loggers in the latter city Sunday. The largest crowd yet to witness a game this year was on hand to see their favorite win.

### Gilbert in Rare Form

Gilbert, Logger hurler was in rare form and let the locals down with only two hits, while his teammates collected a total of ten safe bingles from the offerings of Pritchett and Lake. The Loggers started their scoring in the first inning when Woodward tripled to left on Pritchett's first pitch. On the next pitch to Pritchett, Pritchett pulled a tendon in his arm and was relieved in the box by Lake. Woodward scored and Pritchett was safe at first when Williams fumbled his grounder. Stewart hit into a double play, Lake to Lange to Haight, and Brundage grounded out to retire the side. Kolstad walked and scored on Murray's two-bagger for score number two for the Loggers, in the second inning and again counted two more runs in the third inning on hits by Fischer, Stewart and Brundage.

Coquille's final scores were made in the seventh when Brundage reached first base after striking out due to a passed ball by Harrington and scored a minute later when Kolstad tripled to center. Another passed ball by Harrington allowed Kolstad to score for the Coquilles' sixth and final tally.

Locals Score in 4th  
Medford's only score came in the fourth inning. Haight pulled up at second base when his drive to center field bounced out of Outfielder Brundage's mitt and crossed the plate for the lone tally a few minutes later when Jack Forette singled to left.

Medford's next game will be played Sunday at the fair grounds when they meet the Ashland nine in a league game.

# PORTLAND TO GET ANNUAL BIG GAME

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19.—(AP)—After an absence of 16 years, the Annual big game—the gridiron meeting of Oregon and Oregon State, will come to Portland this year. The game will be played in Multnomah stadium on Armistice day, it has been decided after weeks of dickering and several changes in the stadium schedule.

The 1934 Oregon-OSC game will be played in Eugene, and Corvallis will get the big match in 1935.

The Oregon-Utah game, billed for the stadium November 5, will be played either at Eugene or Salt Lake City, and the Washington State-Oregon State game, scheduled for Portland, will be taken to Corvallis.

Oregon State and Gonzaga will play in the stadium here October 7. The first game in Portland this season will see Oregon Normal and Pacific College at Stockton in a tangle. It will be Alonzo Stagg's first introduction to Pacific coast football.

# HIGH SCHOOL BOY SPRING SURPRISE IN CENTURY DASH

### World Record Time Made by Young Ohian at National Meet — Oregon Athletes Finish in Eighth Place

CHICAGO, June 19.—(AP)—Ralph Metcalfe, the current "fastest human," and Jesse Owens, Cleveland high school boy sprinter, who equaled the world record for the 100-yard dash in the national interscholastic championship track and field meet Saturday, will meet in the National A. U. title meet at Soldier Field July 1.

Owens left officials and spectators amazed Saturday when he won the century in 9.4 seconds. It was not so much of a surprise when Metcalfe hit that figure in the finals of the National Collegiate Athletic association meet on the same track Saturday night, for he has done it more or less frequently.

Also Good in 220.  
In addition to running the 100 in world record time, Owens became the first high school sprinter to beat 21 seconds for the 220-yard dash, winning in 30.7. Metcalfe won the event in the collegiate meet with a world record cracking 20.4.

The Cleveland negro also may elect to try for the national broad jump title. He won the prep title with a jump of 24 feet, 9 1/2 inches, which was more than five inches better than the winning distance of John Brooks, University of Chicago negro, in the collegiate meet. Owens has done close to 25 feet in the event.

Louisiana State turned in the most amazing upset of the season to defeat southern California's Trojans for the national inter-collegiate track and field championships at Soldiers' Field in the 13th and 15th to end the match.

Gorry, little known player from County Kildare, won only one hole in the 18 play, the 12th, where Dunlap slipped one over par.

C. Ross (Sandy) Somerville, Canadian holder of the United States amateur title, advanced with Dunlap to the third round, defeating D. H. R. Martin, an old Oxford blue, four and three.

Lauri Vinci pitched the morning shut-out for Sacramento, holding the Reds to seven hits.

Looking like the team that led the league through most of April, Oakland captured five of seven games from Hollywood and knocked the Stars from their first place berth. The Oaks edged out a 4-3 win in the first half of yesterday's twin bill after taking the Saturday game, 5-2. Otis Brannan's single, following three walks, beat the Aces in the 7-inning nightcap, 3-2.

Although capturing two of the three week-end games, Portland lost its series to Los Angeles, 4-3. The Beavers finished ahead Saturday, 3-2, and in the 7-inning second game yesterday, 3-2. In the opener the Angel sluggers trounced the champions, 15-3. In the nightcap George Blakerny, outfielder and Jim Keesey, Portland first sacker, worked the first coast league triple play of the season.

Seattle divided its Sunday double header with San Francisco to take the series, 4-3. Beaten, 9-6, Saturday and 6-1 in yesterday's opener, the Indians came back to win the short nightcap, 5-2.
