

HIGHWAY BRIDGES MAY BE FINANCED BY STATE FUNDS

Federal Roads Chief Objects to Toll Project Is Word—No Delay in Preparations for Work Is Declaration

SALEM, June 20.—(AP)—Oregon's five coast highway bridges whose construction is projected under federal public works funds, may be operated free rather than as toll-charge structures, State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said today.

Advised of opposition by Director McDonald, chief of the bureau of public roads, to the imposition of toll charges for the use of public highways and of the sympathy of the public works administrator toward McDonald's objections, the state highway commission has authorized the submission of an alternate amortization plan which would obligate the state to pay not more than \$125,000 a year toward retirement of the loan of approximately \$2,300,000. The other \$1,000,000 required for the projects would be a federal grant, which the state would not be obligated to repay.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(AP)—J. M. Devers, attorney for the Oregon highway commission, said here today he had received "encouragement" from the federal public works officials in connection with proposed construction of five bridges on the Oregon coast highway.

Devers said he expects bids for one of the bridges will be advertised within two weeks, and that bids for three of the spans will be advertised within 30 days.

SALEM, June 20.—(AP)—There will be no delay in preparing designs for the proposed five new bridges to be constructed on the Oregon coast highway with funds obtained through the federal public works bill, this was announced here today by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, who declared that under instructions from the state highway commission two shifts of bridge engineers would be at work within the next few days.

"The work will be rushed to speedy completion," Baldock said, "so that the designs can be submitted to the bureau of public roads on a definite schedule."

He said the design for the first bridge will be completed in two weeks, the second bridge in 30 days, the third bridge in 60 days and fourth and fifth bridges in 90 days.

"It would appear that this is an exceptional opportunity for the state of Oregon and one that should not be passed up," Baldock's statement read. The work would be a free gift of \$1,000,000 from the federal government and the employment of a large number of Oregon citizens."

POSTAL SERVICE SAVING PLANNED

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(UP)—A three month economy program for the postal service estimated to save \$9,500,000 was announced today by Postmaster General Farley. It has the approval of President Roosevelt.

The program to be in effect from July 1, to September 30, requires all postal employees, except rural mail carriers, to take a nine day furlough without pay during this period. Equipment maintenance allowance for rural carriers will be reduced from four cents to 1.76 cents per mile per day for the same period.

"It is our confident hope," Farley said, "that the results of this action will materially contribute not only to the balancing of the budget, but also to the economic restoration of the country."

ROADS, HIGHWAYS GROUP TO MEET

An important meeting of the Roads and Highways committee has been called for Wednesday at the Chamber of Commerce at 10:00 a. m., and a good attendance is expected.

Representatives from Chambers of Commerce of Grants Pass and Ashland will also be present.

The meeting will be devoted to a thorough discussion of the question of the foresta lining the Crater Lake highway and immediately following the meeting the committee will proceed to Prospect. This is in keeping with the stand which the Chamber of Commerce took some time ago when the board of directors, by resolution, urged that something be done to combat the denuding of the foresta of this section. E. C. Soltzky, Crater park superintendent, who has taken a leading part in this movement, will attend the meeting also.

WARN SOLICITORS GET CHAMBER O. K.

Under direction of the solicitation and donation committee of the Chamber of Commerce, cards are being placed in the business houses of the city today requesting that solicitors for donations and advertising obtain the endorsement of the Chamber of Commerce. The cards read: "Solicitations for donations and advertising are respectfully referred to the Chamber of Commerce for endorsement."

"It is the purpose of the Chamber of Commerce to curtail as much as possible 'fly by night' solicitors and this can only be accomplished by the full co-operation of all the merchants of the city," stated John Morfett, chairman of the retail merchants' committee, this morning.

It is known that thousands of dollars annually are sent out of Medford, some of them on propositions which have very little merit and it is believed that this sum can be saved by having all requests referred to the Chamber of Commerce for endorsement first.

DOLLAR DAY FARE OVER JULY FOURTH

With dollar day fares in effect over the Fourth of July for the first time, the Southern Pacific company today announced plans for extensive travel in connection with the national holiday this year.

The low-fare program, featuring cent-a-mile transportation, will embrace the five-day period, June 30 to July 4, with return limit of July 11, according to A. S. Rosenbaum, district freight and passenger agent for the company here.

All stations on the railroad's lines in the territory from San Francisco to Salt Lake City, and from Portland to El Paso are to be included in the holiday offer, it was stated.

STRIKE TESTIMONY OF MAN WHO TOOK JONES IN CUSTODY

Testimony of Sergeant Keith Ambrose of the state police, relative to the efforts of the authorities, over a week's period to apprehend Walter J. Jones, mayor of Rogue River, was ordered stricken from the record yesterday by Judge George F. Skipworth, and the jury instructed to disregard it in their deliberations.

The court held that it was competent to show the arrest of Jones but not the efforts expended. The defense also scored when the court held that a declaration made by Henrietta B. Martin, after the "Good Government Congress" had adjourned, was barred. Mrs. Geraldine Krings, a state witness, said she saw Mrs. Martin, her parents, L. A. Banks, a Mrs. Lindsay and another woman waiting, and heard the president of the "congress" make a statement.

The state contends that Mrs. Martin, Banks and others remained upon the suggestion of Jones, and delayed their departure by the rear door, to enable the way to be cleared of ballot pouches and perpetrators.

The state has contended that the "congress" leaders knew of the ballot robbery.

Sergeant Ambrose testified that between March 17 and March 22, a search was made for Jones at his home in Rogue River, up Kane's creek, up Murphy gulch, and at the home of John Koetka in Grants Pass. Koetka was described by Ambrose as a "Grants Pass bootlegger." On the defense objection, the phrase "Grants Pass bootlegger" was ordered stricken.

Under cross-examination Sergeant Ambrose testified that he told Jones when arrested at 5:30 a. m. at his home on March 22 "to get up and dress or I'll do it for you." Jones then got up, the witness said.

The defendant claimed he was ill at the time the sergeant said he called a doctor for Jones as soon as he arrived in this city in custody.

It was also revealed during the examination of Sergeant Ambrose that after the slaying of Constable Prescott state police traveled in fours in making the ballot theft arrests.

An affidavit was filed during the period of Jones' absence that he was sick in Portland.

During the exchange between Attorney Knight of the defense and Assistant Attorney General Moody, the state's attorney replied: "Yes, and we are going to look into that affidavit."

The state asked for a recess at 3:30 p. m. until this morning, and the same was granted by the court.

The classes under which the contest will be considered are: (1) Science, (2) Recreational, (3) Agriculturalist, (4) Human interest.
