BANKER TEARFUL AT CLIMAX LONG FEDERAL HEARING

Former Chairman World's Second Largest Bank Is Overcome As Jury Returns Verdict of Not Guilty

NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—Accused of charges that he had cheated the government of more than \$850,000, Charles E. Mitchell walked flushed and smiling down lower Broadway today toward Wall street, where until recently he was a mighty figure, head of the world's second largest bank and all its affiliates.

His acquittal on charges of income tax evasion ended a period of 24 hours, during which the attitude of the former chairman of the National City bank had become more and more discouraged and hopeless. His face, from which much of the tan had disappeared during his six weeks in the court room, was grim and tired as he returned today.

Max D. Steuer, his chief counsel, pressed through to his side, Mitchell reached an arm around the lawyer's shoulders. He grasped him by the hand.
