FORD'S SURPLUS SUFFERS SLASH

BOSTON, June 23.—(AP)—A reduction of \$14,861,644.58 in the surplus of the Ford Motor company for 1932 compared with 1931 was shown in a statement filed with the Massachusetts commissioner of taxation and corporations today. The surplus for 1932 was \$580,602.54. In 1931 it was \$655,302,247.10. Capital stock was listed as \$17,264,500. A list of assets included "cash, etc.," as \$303,550,429.83, compared with \$372,469,104.62 in 1931.

60-YEAR ROAD JOB ENDED FOR FAMILY

MISSOURI LADS COMING MONDAY FOR CCC CAMPS

Rear cadres for several of the Civilian Conservation Corps camps in the Medford district are scheduled to arrive at various points in southern Oregon Monday, according to announcement issued today.

Lieut. G. A. A. Jones of the headquarters staff, stated this morning that the rear cadres for company 1652, government camp, and 1653, Wingspread camp, left Jefferson Barracks, Mo., last evening, and are scheduled to arrive at Chiloquin Monday.

For company 1642 at Lake o' the Woods, the rear cadre is expected to arrive at Klamath Falls on that date having left the barracks Thursday. Detachments for 1651, Upper Rogue river camp, and for 1650, Mt. Reuben, will be brought to Medford, and are also scheduled to be here on Monday's train.

Enlisted young men for Camp Bly, company 1648 and Camp Ingram, 1647, will reach Lakeview on Monday also, according to present plans.

DELINQUENT STATE TAXES INCREASING

SALEM, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—With three counties yet to report, first half taxes delinquent in the state for the year 1933 aggregate \$9,078,888.68 or 44.73 per cent, it was announced at the offices of the state tax commission late today.

Tax delinquencies, based on reports from all counties in the state in 1932, was 33 per cent. Members of the tax commission said that it was likely that the total tax delinquencies for 1933 would be increased to nearly 50 per cent, although the exact percentage cannot be determined until all the reports are received and tabulated.

Taxes charged against the counties for the year 1933 totaled \$40,804,261.81, of which \$30,297,145.98 was classified as first half. Taxes have been collected in the amount of \$11,218,257.30.

CASCADIANS WILL AID LAKE OPENING

To attend the official opening of Crater Lake national park on July 1, the third annual good-will tour of the Shasta Cascadians will journey to the lake, the week-end trip starting June 30 from Redding, and delegations joining the party on the way north, according to information received today.

Numerous prominent officials, newspaper men and distinguished guests are planning to attend, and "Singing" Jimmy Smith of Los Angeles will be a member of the tour. A merry party will be staged at Crater Lake the evening of July 1, and the program and entertainment will be under the direction of the Klamath county junior chamber of commerce.

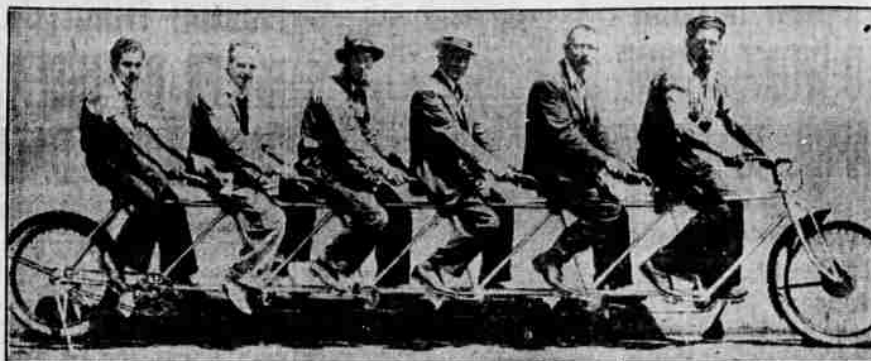

POTATO FAMINE LOOMS, IS WORD

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—The Journal said today that "a near famine" exists in the potato market, and "holdings of potatoes in Oregon, Washington and Idaho are unusually limited with a call for supplies perhaps on the latest date ever known in this territory for the old crop."

"Production has decreased greatly," the article said, "and instead of showing normal seasonal increase over demand, it is actually not keeping pace with the call." The extreme hot weather in the east was said to have
