

Hillah Shriners Will Gather in Ashland Saturday for Ceremonial

COLORFUL PARADE WILL BE FEATURE OF BIG GATHERING

Presentation of Degrees — Banquet, Golf Tournament and Other Items Planned to Keep Visitors Busy

Hillah's summer ceremonial for 1933 will be held at Ashland, the home of the southern Oregon Shrine temple, tomorrow under the direction of Potentate A. K. Cass and his divan. A committee, selected from the nobility by Potentate Cass and headed by Chief Rabban O. O. Alenderfer, has been busy for several weeks perfecting the program for the first gathering of Hillah Shriners since last fall. When a similar ceremonial was staged in the Lithia City. This program will be replete with parades of uniformed bodies, the presentation of the first, second and third sections at the Ashland Armory and a golf tournament when nobles will vie on the beautiful Ashland course for the coveted Hillah Cup.

The ceremonial will be conducted along the line of the very successful Hillah session of last fall. Nobles are being groomed for their pilgrimage across the scorching sands under the watchful eye of Director Dade Terrett and his patrol wrecking crew and some new and novel stunts have been promised for the second section. Before the ceremonial sessions at the Armory, the Hillah patrol, under Captain Rex Barnett, will appear in the colorful parade on Ashland streets. N. G. Wheeler's drum corps, the Klamath Falls unit of Hillah's marching bodies, will also appear in this parade with Ward Croft's fine Shrine band.

The golf tournament on the Ashland course, which will be one of the important features of the afternoon, will see Hillah's outstanding golfers competing for the Hillah cup. Noble John Enders is present holder of the trophy and maschie and niblec artists from all sections of Hillah's jurisdiction will be on hand to capture the cup.

Due to lack of time, play will be for nine holes, commencing at 12:30 noon. Shriners from any Temple may compete but they must tee off between 12:30 and 1:30 p. m. Handicaps will be allowed on basis of home course handicaps or last three scores, according to F. F. Whittle.

PINE LUMBERING TAKES BIG JUMP

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—A sharp increase in new business for the week ending June 17 was reported today by the Western Pine association. The new business amounted to \$2,243,000 feet, about 8 per cent above the three-year weekly average for June, and 22 per cent greater than the previous week. During the week 73 of the 118 member mills were in operation.

Shrimps for the week are 80-280,000 feet, and production 43,250,000 feet, putting production at 31.8 per cent of capacity compared with 30.1 per cent for the previous week, and 14 per cent for the year to date. Current orders were 46 per cent of sawmill capacity.

ALL GRAINS MOVE TO HIGHER LEVELS

CHICAGO, June 23.—(AP)—All future deliveries of wheat, oats and rye jumped late today to beyond season high price records.

Reports were current indicating tremendous crop damage had been done the northwest by recent heat and drought, especially in the Dakotas and Minnesota. Unofficial estimates were that the 1933 probable production of wheat in the United States would fall below the actual domestic disappearance in recent years.

A rush of general commission house purchasing lifted prices sharply late and far more than offset early declines.

Wheat closed buoyant, at the day's top level, 1 1/2-2 1/2 above yesterday's finish, corn 1/2-1 1/4 up, oats 1/4-1 1/4 advanced and provisions 5 to 10 cents down.

2 NAVAL AIRMEN KILLED IN CRASH

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 23.—(AP)—Two naval aviators lost their lives yesterday near Descanso, mountain resort east of here, when their craft plummeted to the ground as their motor quit. The dead are Ensign Mack E. Vorhees, 27, and J. A. Sheridan, 21, seaman, second class. A storekeeper who saw the plane fall, said it circled the wooded hills for several minutes before it was destroyed in the plunge of 300 feet. Indicating the fliers were seeking a place to sit down and inspect an ailing engine.

THREE MEET DEATH IN CRASH OF PLANE

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, June 23.—(AP)—Three Council Bluffs men were killed near here last night when their plane suddenly caught fire, glided earthward in flames for 500 feet and then dove 200 feet to crash on the farm of John Lee. Dick Mason, 21, the pilot; James Hitchcock, and Charlie Fries were the victims.

S. P. WOULD CUT SLEEPER FARES

SALEM, June 23.—(AP)—Permission to reduce coach and tourist sleeper fares 45 per cent between all stations on the Pacific lines has been requested by the Southern Pacific company from the interstate commerce commission and various regulatory bodies. It was announced here late yesterday.

The proposed tariff would establish a basic one-way rate of two cents a mile for such transportation as compared with the present first-class rate of 3.6 cents a mile. If approved it will be made effective July 1, announces Felix S. McGinnis, vice-president in charge of the system passenger traffic.
