National defense is again our topic as the peace conference convenes. Again, as during the World war, there is tumult and strife in all sections of the world. Germany again strives to establish her place in Europe, with Italy, Austria and Hungary, hoping to recover territory lost and the new states of the Baltic ready to defend their freedom; Russia with its large number of soldiers under arms and countless numbers in reserve dreaming of world revolution, England and its colonies of India and its other colonies; Japan and China, and in our own South America many states in constant hostility, we must pledge anew, with the American Legion for an adequate national defense. We must be at the helm to quench the fires of communism for at the base of all these untrests lies the hand of communism. It finds a fertile soil in the minds of those who are unemployed and unhappy.

Our shores must be protected by an army and navy, a National Guard and marine corps that is not hedged about by an economy program which will render them helpless at a time when their aid may be more than needed. Our national defense will be as strong as the people demand but the people of America have not awakened to the dangers of unpreparedness in spite of the lessons that should have been learned from the days of 1917.

We believe in preparedness, in a national security and we stand for protection. We believe in protecting the independence of the United States and the only way we can successfully do this is to be adequately prepared to defend its principles.

The American Legion Auxiliary is a patriotic order and will ever stand firm for a defense program that will guard our homes, our government and our nation.
