

CHAN EGAN THIRD IN OPENING PLAY OF TOURNAMENT

Medford Golfer Cards 144 Opening Round P. N. A. Play — Mrs. Hutchings Takes Women's Honors

VICTORIA, B. C., June 27.—(AP)—Sharp shooting American golfers from south of the international border line, led by Albert (Scotty) Campbell, youthful medalist winner of Seattle, faced Canadian opponents for the most part today as match play opened in the Pacific northwest amateur golf tourney.

Campbell, Seattle city champion and runner-up at the national public links tournament last year, who shot a 71-69-140 card yesterday to win medal honors from the 56 other entries, faced Dr. T. C. Sedden of Spokane, as one of the exceptions. Dr. Sedden's card yesterday was 80-76-186.

On the other hand, Lee Stiel of Seattle, whose 69-72-141 was second best in the opening round, Chandler (Chan) Egan, defending champion of Medford, Ore., who was third with a 73-71-144; Dr. O. P. Willing of Portland, who was in eighth place yesterday with a 75-74-149 but still remains a favorite, and others from over the line had Canadian opposition.

Stiel met G. K. Thompson of Victoria, who shot 77-80-157 yesterday; Egan faced A. N. Watson, Victoria, who had an opening day's card of 77-80-157; and Willing ran up against H. Pretty of Victoria, who had a card yesterday of 73-85-158.

In the women's tourney Mrs. Vera Hutchings of Vancouver, defending champion romped off with medalist honors yesterday, but she was hard pressed by Portland opposition. Her score of 85 was only one stroke better than the 86 carded by Miss M. McDougall of Portland, and Miss Jean Piageman also of Portland was fourth with an 88.

With the wind blowing a 24-mile an hour velocity yesterday, many of the entries used the smaller ball, which is permitted under English rules, among them Campbell in his medal-winning round. Most of them insisted they would do the same today, in the 18-hole match play events.

HELEN MOODY IN DECISIVE DEFEAT FOR BRITISH FOE

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 27.—(AP)—Mrs. Helen Willis Moody opened defense of her Wimbledon singles title today with a smashing love set victory over Mrs. J. P. McCready, veteran British player, 6-0, 6-0.

Kilworth Vines, Jr., defending his Wimbledon title, today advanced to the third round with a four-set victory, 6-1, 4-6, 7-5, 6-1, over A. T. England, unranked British player.

H. W. (Bunny) Austin, one of the British favorites, eliminated the veteran Frenchman, Jacques Brugnon, 6-2, 3-6, 7-5, 6-0, in another second round feat.

Mrs. Moody had the galleries gasping at the brilliance of her shots as she ran out her match against Mrs. MacReady in just 17 minutes. She was the same brilliant champion Wimbledon knew last year and the margin of her victory increased the odds in favor of her taking her sixth Wimbledon title to tie the record of Miss Suzanne Lenglen, her predecessor as No. 1 of the world.

SHARKEY "IN PINK" FOR BATTLE WITH CARNERA

By HERBERT V. BARKER, Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, June 27.—(AP)—Primo Carnera may expect to catch Jack Sharkey out of condition when they step into the ring of Madison Square Garden's Long Island City bowl Thursday night, but if he does, he'll run into an unpleasant surprise.

Jack, at 30, won't be the Sharkey of a few years ago perhaps, but he'll be in first-class shape just the same, trained to the minute and ready for the long 15-round route.

An examination by Dr. Vincent Nardello, of the medical staff of the New York State Athletic commission, effectively disposed of the question of the champion's condition.

Sharkey is in better shape physically and mentally," Dr. Nardello said, "than he was when I examined him a year ago for his fight with Max Schmeling. His disposition is greatly improved. He was too much on edge last year, too nervous. Nervous exhaustion is more tiring than any amount of physical effort. I would say Sharkey is every bit as ready as Carnera."

Sharkey, as a matter of fact, never has looked better than he did yesterday in a simulating two-round workout with Hans Birke, rugged German warrior, at his training camp in Orangeburg, N. Y. The champion was punching viciously to the body with his right hand, snaking punches home with lightning speed, and twice shook up Birke with left hooks that traveled only inches.

Carnera, meanwhile, wound up his intensive preparations at Pompton Lakes, N. J., by boxing three rounds with Harold Mays and two against Arthur Huttick. Both found the huge Italian easy to hit but hard to hurt. Competent boxing critics expressed surprise over Primo's improvement, especially in boxing skill.

Carnera plans no more boxing and will take only enough exercise until the night of the fight to keep himself at top condition. Sharkey expected to wind up boxing today. The betting odds continued to favor Sharkey at 6 to 5.

Word was received today from Mack Lillard, Medford promoter, that he had been unable to sign up wrestlers of sufficient caliber to warrant staging his usual Wednesday show at the Armory and consequently the armory will be dark tomorrow evening. Lillard is angling for a match between Strangler Lewis, or Jim Brown, and some good opponent, and hopes to be able to announce signing of a first-class tussle for a week from Wednesday.

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BRITISH GOLFERS TAKE RYDER CUP FROM AMERICANS

Easterbrook Defeats Shute to Provide Necessary Points in Two Days' Tourney — Climax Is Thriller

SOUTHPORT, Eng., June 27.—(AP)—Great Britain today regained possession of the Ryder cup, emblem of Anglo-American professional golf rivalry, defeating the United States 6 1/2 points to 5 1/2, in two days' competition.

Syd Easterbrook, British pro, scored the deciding victory by defeating Denamore Shute, 1 up, 36 holes, as the climax of one of the most exciting international golf battles ever waged, with the outcome in doubt until the last hole of the final match was completed.

British Win Foursomes. The British divided the eight singles matches played today, but won the foursomes yesterday, 2 1/2 to 1 1/2. The Americans were in the lead only once during the two days, when Captain Walter Hagen vanquished A. J. Lacey, 2 and 1, with the Prince of Wales as an onlooker, but the team score twice was tied by the invaders before the decisive British blow was struck by Easterbrook.

The other three American conquests were scored by Gene Sarazen, who defeated Alfred H. Padham, 6 and 4; Craig Wood, who beat W. H. Davies, 4 and 3; and Horton Smith, victor over Charles Whitcombe by 2 up in a match that tied the score for the last time.

Dutra Trounced. The biggest upset for the Americans was the trouncing administered to Olin Dutra, P. G. A. champion, by Abe Mitchell, who captured 13 out of

14 successive holes and won by 9 and 8 after being 3 down. British triumphs were posted by Arthur Havers, who beat Leo Diegel, 4 and 3, and Percy Alliss, who won a sensational match from Paul Runyan, youngest of the Americans, 2 and 1.

BULLDOG JACKSON PINIONS CLINGMAN

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—Bulldog Jackson of Klamath Falls won the main event of last night's wrestling matches here from Otis Clingman of Oklahoma City, but only after losing the last of four falls.

Jackson took the first fall with a hammerlock in 17 minutes. Clingman evened it up 14 minutes later with a flying Dutchman and a pin hold. In the third fall, Art O'Reilly of Eugene first awarded the tumbler to Clingman, then reversed his decision and declared that Jackson won in 8 minutes with a Boston crab hold.

Logger Helbert, 160, St. Helens, won

the semi-windup from Bull Stastny, 143, Portland, who took two out of three falls from Art O'Reilly, 150, the Eugene wrestler who referred the final event. The opener went to Jess McCann.

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
