LOS ANGELES, June 27.—(AP)—David Hutton ventured back to Angeles Temple today after a secluded stay somewhere the last few days and promptly became verbally embroiled in the writer of divorce rumors circulating about him and Aimee Temple McPherson-Hutton, evangelist, now in Paris.

The evangelist's husband threw back the heavy drapes which have darkened the windows of the temple parsonage since he went away and turned to remark to a group of listeners: "I've learned a lot in the past couple of weeks and as a result I'm not going to either deny or affirm anything. Probably, if I got a divorce, I wouldn't go as far as Nevada. I might stay right here. But mind, you, I'm not talking about anything." The rumors had speculated upon the possibility that a divorce might be sought in Reno.

GERMANY AGREES TO WHITTLE DEBT

LONDON, June 27.—(AP)—An agreement was reached late today between Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the Reich's bank, and Germany's long term creditors by which the Germans pledged payment of "something" in interest on all long term coupons as they are due.

The amount to be paid will be announced by Dr. Schacht from Berlin Friday. The interest on the Dawes and Young plan loans will be met, as previously agreed, but the question of the Young sinking fund still is unsettled.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC INCREASES LABOR

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—(AP)—Southern Pacific Co. announced today it was speeding up its working schedule in shops, putting 2952 men on a 5-day week, and replacing the 3-day week which has been in effect about 2 years. The new schedule became effective today.

TURKEY GROWERS IN SLAP AT RAILROADS

ROSEBURG, June 27.—(AP)—Because railroads reputedly declined to lower the transcontinental rate from \$3 a hundred pounds, to \$2, the Northwest Turkey Growers' association Monday notified headquarters of the Oregon Turkey Growers' here that it has decided to move the bulk of the 1933 tonnage by water and truck lines.

YREKA RAIL CHIEF'S BAIL REMAINS HIGH

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—(AP)—Reduction of his \$20,000 bail was denied by Federal Judge A. F. St. Sure today to H. A. DeVaux, former president of the Yreka railroad, who is awaiting trial on a charge of converting proceeds from a bond sale to his own use.

DeVaux was arrested in Houston, Tex., eight months ago, and recently was acquitted in Los Angeles of similar charges growing out of the sale of bonds in his railroad company. He is in jail in default of bail.

PACIFIC ISLAND ONCE ON CHART NOW IS MISSING

TOKYO, June 27.—(AP)—Ganges Island, shown on maps of the Pacific ocean at 30.57 degrees north latitude, 154.10 degrees east longitude, has disappeared, according to Japanese naval surveyors who have just completed an extensive hydrographic cruise.

They reported a thorough survey was made of the Magellan Archipelago without a trace of the island. Ganges is shown near the steamship route from Yokohama to Honolulu, about a quarter of the distance from the Japanese port. The total distance is 3,445 nautical miles.

The Magellan, or Magelhaes Archipelago, which includes Ganges Island, extends from the southern Japanese coast about half way to Hawaii. The Times Atlas says they are mostly uninhabited. Aman's Gazeer says they are all uninhabited except for Peel Island, largest of the Bonin group. The Bonin group was recognized as belonging to Japan in 1861, after which few American and British settlements disappeared.

NO DISABLED VET TO BE NEGLECTED

CINCINNATI, O., June 27.—(AP)—The assurance of President Roosevelt that "no man who has been disabled in after life by his service to his country shall be forgotten or unrewarded to the fullest extent that our financial condition permits" was before the convention of the Disabled American Veterans today.

"You may have no fear," said the president in a telegram, "that anything has been done which will bar any war sufferer from the grateful recognition of his country."

National Commander William Conley, of Los Angeles, has criticized the Roosevelt policies affecting disabled service men.

The women's auxiliary of the D. A. V. heard its commander, Mrs. Freida Mooney, of California, point to "the chasm that yawns before the benefits and rights of your loved ones."

ROOSEVELT HELD IN MAINE WATER BY FOG BLANKET

LAKEMAN BAY, Roque Island, Me., June 27.—(AP)—Fogbound for the second day in succession, President Roosevelt looked about the Amberjack II today as he awaited a visit from Norman H. Davis, America's roving ambassador.

Davis left Boston last night on the destroyer Barnadou, which was poking her way northward through the fog at about 10 knots. The chief executive was hoping the destroyer would arrive before darkness made it impossible to enter this little harbor.

Davis is expected to give the president a first hand account of the deliberations of the Geneva disarmament conference, which he attended as head of the American delegation. The Barnadou also is bringing Marvin H. McIntyre, one of the president's secretaries and James Roosevelt, son of the president, who made a swift trip to Boston to participate in the state convention for repeal of the 18th amendment.

After a late breakfast cooked by George Briggs, one of the crew members, President Roosevelt spent a couple of hours studying wireless reports from Washington outlining the progress of national affairs.

CHICAGO, June 27.—(AP)—Slaughtering establishments of the nation could look back upon last month as the best in their business since January, 1932, the Chicago federal reserve bank announced today. Not only did production increase 12 1/2 per cent over April, but it was 14 per cent greater than May, 1932, and 11 1/2 per cent in excess of 1923-32 average for the month.
