SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—(UP)—Unmindful of the imposing array of soldiers, sailors and fighting equip- ment the United States keeps around San Francisco, a hungry army was de- scending on this city today. The 10,000 trees in Golden Gate park will be subjected to destructive attacks within a few days, Erick Walthar, park pathologist, announced tonight. "The only defense," Walthar in- vented, "is to cut down and burn all stricken trees."

From far-off Dutch West Indies, via St. Thomas, a letter has traveled to Medford seeking a buying public for handwork of a young lady, Sylvia Hassell, who finds the islands a dull place and money very, very scarce. Addressing her plea to the humane society, she sent with it a lovely handkerchief, trimmed with hem- stitching and drawnwork for which she asks the sum of 50 cents. The letter, received by Mrs. Sidney Rich- ards of the humane society, also lists the prices of the many other articles made by the young lady, ranging from handkerchiefs and tray cloths to baby clothes and altar cloths. "I am living in Sabo, an island in Dutch West Indies, and being poor, I have to do fancy work to earn a living," the girl writes in explanation to the humane society. "There is nothing else for girls to work at on this island and I find it hard to earn a living. I am hoping your friends will order some of my hand work as I have to help my parents and find life very hard on this iso- lated and barren little island."

MOLEY TO SEEK ADJOURNMENT OF ECONOMIC MEET

(Continued from Page One.) makes agreement on that subject virtu- ally impossible. It is no secret that Mr. Roosevelt failed to get tariff authority from congress. The legislators privately refused to give it to him. There is something of a public secret about the fact that what Congress wrote into new laws will probably make it ILLEGAL (or at least impossible) for the president to enter specific tariff adjustments.

The National Recovery Act and the Farm Control Bill carry obscure pro- visions requiring tariff protection for their operation. The president can make no agreements to interfere with them. That means he can make no worth- while agreements at all.

The climax of the farce is silver. Great headlines are spread around the world indicating something impor- tant is to be done about it. The Pittman plan is submitted with the UNANIMOUS approval of the Ameri- can delegation. Everyone is led to be- lieve that here at last the silver problem is to be solved.

The truth is that no one on the inside expects it will. The plan was sent to a sub-committee which is just another word for grave. Among the delegates only Senator Pittman is strong for action. The others just let him stage his little show. In the end some minor or general action may be taken. It will not be anywhere near the importance of the Pittman plan.

The worry among our big-wigs is that failure of the conference may cause international hard feelings. For that reason you will see them cushion the drop of the many hopes. Termination will not be abrupt if they can help it. A lot of high-sound- ing resolutions will be passed telling what g-r-rreat progress has been made. It is a very dangerous deception to keep upon such a grand scale. Some deviations from it may be required.

You might have thought the Ameri- can tariff proposal was a deviation. It was not. Our people knew in advance the French would not accept such a move. Otherwise they would not have of- fered it.
