

Final Odds May Favor Carnera in Battle With Champ Thursday

TREND TOWARD MAN MOUNTAIN SURPRISES ALL

Even Bookies Mystified By Rush Of Money On Italian In Fifteen Round Bout For Jack Sharkey's Title.

FIGHT RETURNS
The 15-round Sharkey-Carnera heavyweight title bout will be described blow by blow over the Mail Tribune's loudspeaker in front of the newspaper office on North Fir street Thursday evening beginning about 5:30 local time. Southern Oregon fans are invited to be present and hear the report as it is received over Associated Press leased wires direct to the Mail Tribune. There will be no radio hookup from the ringside, it is announced by the promoters.

NEW YORK, June 28.—(AP)—For the first time in boxing history, a heavyweight champion may enter the ring a short-ender in the betting when Jack Sharkey ducks under the ropes in Madison Square Garden's Long Island bowl tomorrow night for his 15-round title defense against Primo Carnera.

Today champion Jack was a bare 6 to 5 choice with some quotations as low as 11 to 10 and there were strong indications Carnera would be no worse than an even money bet, and perhaps a slight favorite, by fight time.

Just what has caused the rush of money on the mammoth Italian's chance had even the book-makers mystified, but it seemed possible Carnera's knockout victory over ill-fated Ernie Schaaf, as well as Sharkey's inactivity, may have played an important part. Schaaf, knocked out in the 18th round of his match with Carnera at the Garden Feb. 10, died of inflammation of the brain four days later. The outcome of that match, apparently, has led the customers to tag Carnera a dangerous puncher.

As a matter of fact there has been nothing in the big Italian's previous bouts with first-class heavyweights to indicate any such thing. Sharkey himself had few, if any, uncomfortable moments when he outpointed Primo at Ebbets field two years ago and a long list of other heavyweights, including King Levinsky, Jimmy Maloney, Paulino Uocudun, Stanley Porde, Hans Birkie, Larry Gains and Art Laskey have traveled the full ten-round route against him. Gains, Porde and Maloney all hold decision over him at that distance.

On of face of things, the trend toward Carnera hardly seems justified. Sharkey has trained faithfully and well. No longer quite as fast as he was a few years ago, the Boston all-or-nothing hard-punching veteran who, on his good nights, is all but unbeatable.

Sharkey is forced to concede Carnera tremendous physical advantages—60 pounds in weight, many inches in height and reach—but he has beaten the Italian before and probably is fully convinced he can repeat.

The opening preliminary on the card is scheduled for 7 p. m. (E. S. T.) with the main bout between 8:30 and 9 p. m.

NEW YORK (AP)—You'll have to go back a long way in fight history to find a heavyweight championship match to compare with the Sharkey-Carnera shindig in its bizarre characteristics.

In some way it's fantastic, this reunion meeting between the cold-eyed sinner and the mammoth, slow-witted fellow who once was a circus strong boy. It has more angles than a futuristic landscape.

Twenty months ago Sharkey gave Carnera an unmerciful beating at Ebbets field, knocking the big Italian flat early in the evening and then making a picture puzzle of his features.

Might Be Even Money
If you were among those who sat at the ringside that night it would be difficult to realize the same pair are about to meet again for the world title.

But they are, and this time the

odds on Jack Sharkey, as champion, are shorter than they were in the first scrap! If one may credit all he hears, it will be close to an even-money proposition by the time they enter the ring at Long Island Bowl Thursday night.

If big Primo should win, he will be the first flatficer in modern heavyweight history to take the title from a man who previously had dealt him a lacing.

Another unusual aspect lies in the fact that Sharkey, in the first defense of his crown, faces the giant who a few months ago caused, either directly or indirectly, the death of his friend and stablemate, Ernie Schaaf. Known as Sharkey's "copper," Schaaf never recovered consciousness after collapsing under Carnera's blows.

How will Primo conduct himself in his first fight after that tragic episode? Will he throw those great fists of his quite as hard and with the memory of Schaaf add fury to Sharkey's attack?

The background of the challenger, particularly his ring history, is grotesque. Few who saw him perform on his first circus-like tour of this country a few years ago could have pictured him as a heavyweight menace in 1933.

Changes Wrought By Time
Then he was nothing more or less than the latest, the funniest "foreign threat." He traveled all about, meeting carefully selected opponents and knocking them over so cold. Some of his antagonists scarcely waited to be hit, in fact, and various boxing commissions scratched Primo from their list of intimates.

Yet today "Big Boy" as he is called by the more imaginative critics, enjoys the very best of standing in boxing's select circles, and where he couldn't box a lick in his salad days now is recognized as a pretty cagy customer with his dukes.

He is about to fight one of the game's cleverest workmen, and many smart persons think he will win. It doesn't make sense, but it's so.

Queen of Southern Links Adept From First Swing

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Youthful Miss Anela Gorczyca, winner of the 1933 Women's Southern, Texas state and Fort Worth city links titles, is one of the fortunate few to whom the knack of swinging a club comes naturally.

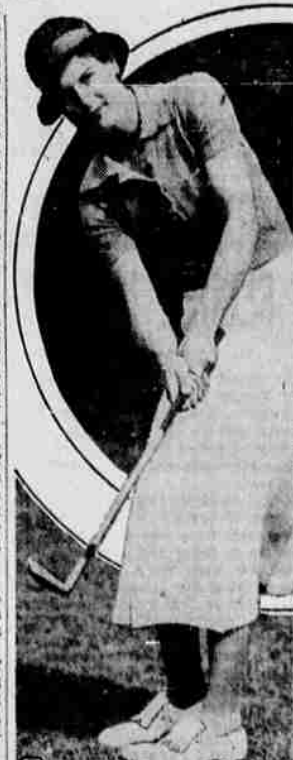
The golfing career of this brilliant youngster, who also won the medal in all three tournaments and plans to enter the women's national meet, dates back six years to the day when a slight, "pig-tailed" girl just starting high school begged permission to play a round with her older brother, Jack.

Needed No Instruction
A bag of rented clubs initiated her into the game, and from the first she could hit the ball. Enthusiasm over the sport, within a couple of years she could beat her brother. From time to time a professional gave her advice, but neither tried nor needed to change her swing.

Three years ago, when she was 18, Miss Gorczyca went to the finals of the women's city tournament. Grown tall, with powerful shoulders which aided her long shots, she practiced on her short game until last year she gained the city title and medal honors in the Southern.

Faithful Trainer
On her father's side Miss Gorczyca is Polish. Her mother comes from an Irish family which settled in west Texas half a century ago.

She trains for tournament golf more faithfully than many football stars, eschewing tobacco and alcohol in any form. Quiet and unassuming, she is a favorite even with the women she defeats.

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EGAN WILL FACE HOT COMPETITION IN TODAY'S PLAY

Medford Star Faces Barrett Of Victoria In Second Round Of Pacific Northwest Amateur Tourney.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 28.—(AP)—Eight Americans, with the ranks of their "best threats" still undiminished, battled in the second round of the Pacific Northwest amateur golf tournament today over the rolling slopes of the Oak Bay course.

With overwhelming victories for the most part in the opening day's play yesterday, three of the favorites, H. Chandler (Chan) Egan, of Medford, Ore., defending champion, Dr. O. F. Willing, of Portland, and Young Albert (Sooty) Campbell, of Seattle, ran into stiffer opposition.

ALABAMA BRIDGE TEAM CHAMPIONS IN WORLD TEST

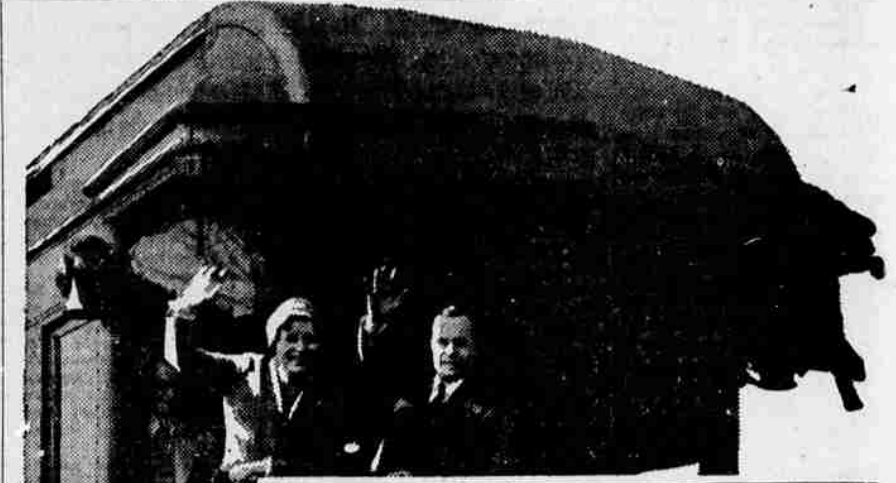
